




BOOK REVIEW by Lois Warner

200 Quilting Tips, Techniques & Trade Secrets Susan Briscoe St. Martin's Griffin, New York 2009 Guild Library #122

This book is chock - a - block full of useful information. It has been in our guild library for a while (given the lower number), but contains up - to - date information on quilting procedures and problems we face every day. Don't only consider the latest titles in our library as there are some gems in the older books. This is one of them!

From choosing equipment and materials to finishing the quilt, this book is arranged in a logical sequence of start to finish, with topics often cross - referenced for further assistance. Susan Briscoe is obviously English as her term for 'piecing' is 'American Patchwork', but she does use 'batting' instead of the English term, 'wadding'! She doesn't overwhelm with a lot of information, but rather provides bits of information, a lot of photos and encouragement.




Many of the pages include 'Try it' panels which give ideas for experimenting with methods and materials, plus projects to practice and develop new skills and techniques. The 'Fix It' panels contain hints for avoiding common pitfalls. To remove creases from batting, have you ever used a hair drier on the hot setting? A magnifying glass is used to show a closeup detail of a quilt, a great way of explaining something. There are step - by - step sequences presented to show a given quilting technique. For example, construction of mitered corners using striped fabric is sure making the procedure look so easy.

Check out setting a circle into the background fabric - quicker than appliqueing the circle in place, and all that is needed is the 'special formula' (see pg. 75). Another idea which will give a better straight stitch and reduce the tendency for stitches to get 'chewed up' at the start of a seam - use a straight stitch throat plate on your machine. This has only one hole, not a longer slot as for zigzag, so BE SURE to change throat plates if you are using any other setting than a straight stitch! (Recent experience, I must be a slow learner!).

On pages 46 and 47 you will find excellent advice concerning rotary cutters and mats. No, not the usual 'don't cut over pins', but a suggestion to use both sides of the cutting mat and cut with the ruler's measurements, not the mat's. If you consistently cut on the mat's lines, eventually gouges will form which won"t allow clean cuts of fabric, even with a new blade. As a final 'gem' found in this book (there are many, many more) I found out how to save fabric when foundation paper piecing. Not only will this method save you fabric but pieces won't get mixed up as each will be marked (pg. 68).

Having gone through this book, it seems there are well over 200 tips, techniques and trade secrets! The information is clearly written, and the photos explain so much. Valuable information at the end of the book concerning making group quilts, visiting and entering quilt shows rounds out an exceptional book in our library.



Dear Miss Fussy Cut,

I am a newish 'trying to quilt' guild member. One of the things I struggle with is 'squaring up'.

I constantly hear talk about this, have asked questions, bought all the different sized rulers and yet, I fail.

I used to sew clothing. It seems to me that a well-placed dart or two would do the trick.

I hope you can help!

Dear Ruler Wrangler,

Don't give up! This is the step that is so often overlooked but is the most critical after your perfect seam allowance.

One of the big differences in quilting is the seam allowance of 1/4", and most blocks may have several in one small block, so it is critical to be accurate. Therefore, when we square up our blocks it is a chance to get all the geometry correct for the perfect fit.

Now I don't believe you need every ruler on the market but you need a good square with a diagonal line from corner to corner that will cover your block. You need to be able to slip the ruler to see your markings and trim to size trimming the right and top first. Then carefully rotate block and ruler and trim what was the bottom and left side.

Be sure to keep your ruler steady and be gentle turning your block.

At this stage in our lives most of us know what we can or cannot do and also what we like to do or are good at doing.

I joined the guild seven years ago. Where has the time gone? My first full day at the guild was also the first business meeting of the guild year in September. I admit that I knew next to nothing about how this particular guild was run. During the afternoon there was a little buzz going around. "No one is running the kitchen." Horror of horrors!

So, is it best to sit back and observe what is going on, preferably on your hands to prevent them from shooting up, or is it better to jump in with both feet and volunteer? Someone with amazing powers of persuasion talked me into taking it on — no previous experience required! Two very brave people also stepped up and joined me that night, and every meeting night for the next couple of years.

It was a great way to get to know my fellow quilters and a great way for them to get to know me!

There are many chores in the Guild that do not involve speaking in front of everyone, running meetings, keeping the minutes, looking after the finances, or any of the many administrative tasks our fearless leaders undertake on our behalf. These "Behind the Scenes" jobs are just as essential and help us all enjoy our sewing days together.

Kitchen duties: The term "Kitchen Kops" was coined during my tenure and I'm still not quite sure if it was entirely complimentary! This job calls for the making of coffee and hot water for tea in the urns; purchasing milk and cream the day of meetings, and making sure there's coffee, tea and sugar. Peanut Butter Chocolate Oat Bars

Submitted Susan Richert

1 cup butter or margarine

¹/₂ cup brown sugar

1 teaspoon vanilla

3 cups quick cooking oats (use gluten free if needed – I used "Only Oats" brand)

1 cup chocolate chips (I used the Enjoy brand which is gluten free) ¹/₂ cup peanut butter

Melt butter on the stove. Stir in sugar and vanilla until melted. Mix in the oats. Cook over low heat 2-3 min. until well blended. Press ½ of the mixture into a parchment paper lined pan (8x8) Melt chocolate chips and peanut butter over low heat. Pour over the base. Crumble remaining oats on top. Press down gently.




