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HONEY BEES

Seventy of the top 100 food crops grown worldwide rely on pollinators. This is equivalent to 90 percent of the world's nutrition. Considering that around 850 million people across the world are currently suffering from lack of food, coupled with the fact that the global population is set to balloon up to nine billion by 2050, we're going to need all bees on deck if we hope to avoid mass food scarcity.


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MEMBERSHIP DUES!

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

BOOK REVIEW by Lois Warner

Skinny Quilts and Table Runners II **15 Designs from Celebrated Quilters**

Edited by Eleanor Levie

With summer coming shortly, why not look to making a runner, rather than a full size quilt. It will be quicker to make and can be adapted to the season. Eleanor Levie has done another exceptional job of publishing 15 more designs for narrow quilts. Her first book, "Skinny Quilts and Table Runners I", showed that quilts can be both art AND craft. Her quilt 'Waking up, down the shore', page 77, certainly captures the scene as would a painter!



The variety of quilts range from folk art to historical reproductions, with many contemporary quilts in between. The quilters featured are mainly Americans, with many names familiar to a lot of us. To begin, however, an Australian quilter has captured the 'outback' with bold colors and even a hint of aboriginal art. Following "Outback Sunset" is "Autumn Leaves" by Jane Davila. What a contrast! Jane's strength lies in art quilting and in this quilt she even incorporates copper wire swirls couched onto contrasting fabric squares.

Karla Anderson, author of "Stack the Deck", has adapted her speed piecing technique to make "Rungs" (pg. 18). Here she cuts blocks and strips, shuffles them and sews - result, a skinny quilt which looks very elaborate, made in no time! Fusible appliqué is used on "Birds of a Feather", while Sue Spargo has produced "Four O'clock Folk Art" using felted wool for her appliqué pieces. In this folk art piece, there is neither batting nor quilting, but the piece exudes warmth.

Lonni Rossi, well known for her fabric collection with Andover, has provided "Seasons of the Moon" using her mottled, swirly, metallic, sophisticated prints. Next comes a bold and bright "the Dalia is a Diva" by Julie Popa of Sunflower Hill Designs. Fusible appliqué with machine blanket stitch makes quick work of this runner.

There is a sharp contrast again, between "Starry Night" with its pieced eight point stars, and the next project, "Flowing Lines". This skinny quilt is simply seven long, gently curved pieces of fabric sewn together - very elegant! Frieda Anderson's "Blushing Aspens" demonstrates a new method for joining curved leaf edges to background fabric. Jo Morton is well known for her reproduction of antique quilts, and "Rhubarb Crisp" with its sawtooth stars and flying geese doesn't disappoint. Two more classic patterns, the pieced "House" block and "Oak Leaf and Reel" appliqué are combined in "An American in Paris", resulting in a lovely, romantic quilt.

"Wisteria Lane" is a gorgeous fused quilt with wisteria growing up a brick wall. Mortar on the bricks, vines, stems and wisteria clusters are all fused to the background fabric - what a stunning result! Sue Benner has yet another take on flowers with her "Fabulous Cut Flowers". Instead of individual fused flowers and leaves, as in "Wisteria Lane", Sue goes big and fuses colorful layers on top of colorful layers, resulting in five magnificent flowers. Often the use of thrift shop silk and rayons provides more zing to these flowers.

Each quilter/artist provides a material list along with clear instructions and diagrams for each project. Full size templates are included along with quilting suggestions, while general directions are briefly included at the end of the book. "Skinny Quilts and Table Runners II" is so full of ideas, suggestions and 'how tos' it could almost be a quilting guide all on its own. Take a look! Become inspired!

Dearest Dog Lover (aka vacuum driver!)

Well, it sounds like you now know about the jelly roll crumbs! (That's all the lint and bits as you open your roll.) I have a very simple solution to help you with that mess. Try taking a lint roller and rolling it across both sides of the jelly roll to pick up the excess lint or crumbs!

This can be done with any of your pre cuts. But when it comes to any pre-washing, don't even think of throwing anything in the washer! This is a case for the old fashioned hand washing/soaking in the sink and a gentle pat down in a towel. No wringing out, unless of course you were planning on making a braided rug, then I think anything goes!

Now as for your kitchen mess from your "loved ones" —what if you put a sheet of "mactack" sticky side up under their bowl! I think that would be sure to keep the kibble from roaming across the floor. Just think of the savings for more thread and fabrics!

You see, he's pretty much a lint freak. For as long as we have been together, he's been picking bits of lint off his clothes, off the upholstery, even off the doormats. He can't pass the dryer without checking the lint filter. "It could cause a fire, you know!" When I tear the grocery list off the notepad, I automatically write "lint rollers" on the next page! Once I heard the doorbell ring and the next thing I knew he was calling, "Honey, come listen to this guy about this great vacuum that filters lint out of the air with water!" As if I wanted to lug 20 pounds of water around while doing the floors! Two weeks ago it all came to a head. I walked in from shopping with my bag full of Swiffer sheets, Static Guard and a new miracle duster, and there he was at the kitchen table — with my sewing machine — taken all apart!

So Miss Fussy Cut, is lint in your machine really that big a deal? The machine still seems to work OK. Who needs to apologize?

Dear Ms Solicitor Searcher,

Well, my dear, you better start baking your honey's favourite treats. You owe him the apology and a big thank you for saving you precious time spent with your machine at your sewing technician's on a waiting list.

You need to keep your feed dogs cleaned regularly from the build up of lint. It can sometimes get so packed in it can look like felt! Poor quality thread leaves behind much lint and dust. This can build up in your tension, bobbin case and thread guides. This also leads to inconsistent thread travel and stitches. More seriously however, it can also create mechanical problems by soaking up lubrication, effectively running your machine dry.

So I will say that, yes, lint buildup in the machine is a big deal.

Now if he can get your machine all back together, give him a big hug! and say sorry and thank you.

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CARREEN'S COOKERY CORNER

It seems a little early to be putting this recipe in the newsletter, but it is the last one until fall, when everyone is coping with a surfeit of these green vegetables. Everyone, except me. Other folks have home grown zucchini just about coming out their ears, but if you are like me, this recipe is worth going to the farmer's market to purchase..

Zucchini Appetizer

3 cups thinly sliced zucchini (with skin on)	1/2 cup finely chopped onion
1 cup Bisquick baking mix	1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese
2 tablespoons chopped parsley	1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon dried oregano	1/4 teaspoon ground pepper
1 clove garlic, crushed or minced	1/2 cup olive oil (or any vegetable oil)
4 eggs, lightly beaten	1/2 teaspoon seasoning salt

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F, then grease a 9 x 13" pan
2. Mix all ingredients together (how easy is that?) and spread in pan.
3. Bake for 25 minutes or until golden brown.

You can add in a bit of red pepper for added colour, or change the veggies completely by using finely chopped broccoli. Any or all the herbs can be changed: summer savory, dried or fresh sage, fresh or dried thyme. You can even change the cheese: from straight cheddar to Manchego (good with sun-dried tomatoes), even a substitute "cheese" works.

You can add extra cheese over the top just before baking.

Chicken with Pineapple

Serves: 3 large portions/4 smaller portions

This is an adaptable recipe. You can substitute, add more of one thing, cut back on another. I use regular soy sauce, but to make it gluten free, buy gluten free soy sauce.

2 chicken breasts	1/2 cup chopped pineapple (fresh or canned)
1/2 cup whole water chestnuts	2 sticks celery
1 onion	1/2 cup frozen peas or corn, or both
1/4 cup cornstarch	1 chicken Oxo sachet
1 – 2 tablespoons soy sauce	2+ tablespoons sweet Thai chili sauce
1/2 – 1 cup water (use some of pineapple juice)	
2 tablespoons oil	

1. Cut up chicken into 1 inch cubes. (You can use chicken thighs too)
2. Cut pineapple into smaller chunks.
3. Slice celery into 1/4 – 1/3 inch slices, on the diagonal (looks better!)
4. Slice onion into segments, skinny ones.
5. Mix chicken with cornstarch.
6. Heat oil in skillet or wok.
7. Shaking each piece of chicken to remove excess cornstarch (do not chuck the remaining cornstarch), put chicken into hot oil and fry till golden brown on all sides. You might have to turn down the heat. Make sure chicken is cooked through. Remove from pan.
8. Adding a little more oil if necessary, saute the onion, then add in celery, peas and water chestnuts. Cook until tender crisp. Return chicken to pan
9. Slake (moisten) remaining cornstarch in the bowl with a little water. You might need a little more cornstarch, depends on how well coated the chicken was.
10. Add this to the pan, along with the remaining water (hold some back in case the sauce is not thick/thin enough), and add in the chicken Oxo sachet and soy sauce.
11. Add in the sweet Thai chili sauce to taste.
12. Serve over rice or noodles.

Variations: add in sugar snap peas, red pepper, mushrooms.

- Low profile chip box
- Air Threading: Upper and lower looper thread
- Dust cover included
- Safety switch sensor for looper and side

For many of things you find on the internet, it's difficult to find the original source.

If you are submitting something regularly to the newsletter, please send a new file of exactly what you would like to have in your section by the due date of the 15th of each month. There are a couple of reasons for this request:

- It's very time consuming to search through old files and working to a deadline does not allow for this. Most of the last minute changes that have had to be made before the newsletter is published are the result of outdated or inaccurate information being repeated, and sometimes these issues are missed. It's easy to overlook these issues when you are not part of the committee.
- Committee heads are the best people to help ensure that the newsletter information is accurate, complete and up-to-date.
- Many members have stated that they stop reading articles that are repeated month after month.


