

So your mat is all cracked up? I guess it feels a little like my feet, always working and maybe wanting a little relaxing time. Now it is payback time.

Remember that queen sized quilt you just cut last week? Well, that was tough on its surface. Time for the tub!

They are called self healing mats, but sometimes they need a little help along the way so turn on your tap with cool water and place your mat flat in the bottom of your bathtub and let it have a soak for 15 to 20 minutes. Never use warm water because this will warp your mat.

If you want to give it a wash, you can use a mild dish soap and a soft brush for a little scrub. Use a mushroom brush or soft toothbrush. If you have a mat cleaner, you can give it a rub down prior to the soaking.

Your mat is good to you so in return you need to be good to it as well.

Rinse it off and pat it dry and let it air for a bit, then back to cutting.






# **BOOK REVIEW by Lois Warner**

Artful Log Cabin Quilts From Inspiration to Art Quilts
Katie Pasquini Masopust
C + T Publishing 2017
Guild Library #645

I suspect that those of us who attended an evening presentation of Art Quilts given by Katie PM last fall were all moved to some degree. Love them or hate them, art quilts are here to stay, and provide yet another aspect of quilting. Katie began as a traditional quilter, but the pull of 'how would it look if I changed something?' was strong, and that was certainly demonstrated in the second half of her slide show.



As a person who loved making traditional log cabin quilts, Katie put a new spin on this traditional design and made it more abstract. Using different grids (such as diamonds) rather than the traditional perpendicular grid (squares) was the first step in branching out in a new direction. After placing a traditional or non-traditional grid over a photograph, she could make up each block in the colours seen in that part of the photograph. A lily is no longer just seen as an actual lily, but rather the shapes and colours are depicted by fabric strips in each log cabin block, producing a lily quilt.

The first step in making an artful log cabin quilt is the selection of a photograph. Composition is important when selecting a good photograph. It needs contrasts in colour and value (lightness or darkness). The next step is to select the grid. The grid breaks the photo into units that will become the log cabin blocks. Given that most of us are used to an even, perpendicular log cabin grid (eg. barn raising), you'll be happy to find it used on page 34 in the Summer Dahlias quilt. But, the next page (35) uses a wonky grid for crocuses in the quilt 'Spring Frost'. Doesn't the wonky grid produce a much more dynamic quilt? The crocus forms can almost be identified.

The next step is to cut, sort and organize the fabric strips. Colour photos show various methods of storage for easy access as you work on your blocks.

Several pages explain how to enlarge your photo's grid to the size of the finished quilt. Next comes construction of each block. Remember, you aren't making your flower look like a flower, but rather are using the proportions of separate colours in each block. This frees you from having to make an exact duplicate of the block in the photograph. Construction is done as for a traditional log cabin block, starting from the centre and working to the outside of your actual size block in your enlarged grid. The block should be 1/4" larger than the finished block size (seam allowances), then squared up.

The blocks can now be put together, have appliqué added if desired, then quilted and finished. Given that this is a quilt with many seams, machine quilting is desirable using anything from a grid to spiral patterns.

The last sections deal with blocking, making a hanging sleeve, making a label and binding the quilt. An interesting gallery of works follows with some photos showing quilting stitches used. This is always useful to see, especially when the designer says "quilt as desired". Now what should I do?!.

This book states on the cover "Advance Reading Copy (not colour correct)". Besides the lower-grade paper used, my only complaint is there are no page numbers in the table of contents. This means thumbing through to find 'Quilting' on page 59. On page 42 under Block Construction it says 'Refer to Grids (page XX)' which means you have to go back to find 'Grids' which started on page 14.

A minor complaint, but hey, the book was a gift from Katie PM.


















#### Marjorie Arnold's Birthday Celebration
