
DECEMBER PROGRAM

Any member who has used beads on their work is invited to bring a beaded piece to display the various ways beads can be used by quilters.

Guild Library Books that deal with **Beading:**

- #207: Embellishing with Anything by Gladys Love
- #457 Beading Artistry for Quilts by Thom Atkins
- #147 Quilt Toppings by Melody Crust
- #159 Beaded Crazy Quilting by Cindy Gorter



- Use a large bead to serve as a fastener on a bag, or add to a zipper pull.
- Cover seams or decorate crazy quilting with beads.
- Use alphabet beads: spell the name of the recipient on the label of your quilted work; spell out a message on a crazy quilt square or on a piece of fibre art; add your name in beads to your name tag.
- Add a beaded design to felt moccasins.
- Embellish appliqued flowers with beads along the edges of the petal or at their centres.
- Add a beaded fringe to a small wall hanging.
- Combine embroidery and beading to quilt squares in a Baltimore style hanging.
- Add a beaded ornament (a star or tree) as a centre of interest on a small quilted picture.
- Choose a charm as your symbol, for instance, a bird or smiling sun, and sew it to every quilt label on your quilts as your personal mark.
- Decorate quilted clothing with bead trims and embellishments.
- Embellish greeting cards, artist trading cards, postcards, Christmas stockings, fancy pillow covers with beads, beads, and MORE beads.

BOOK REVIEW by Lois Warner

THREAD WORK UNRAVELED Sarah Ann Smith AQS Publishing 2009 Guild Library #382

I have uncovered a "gem" in our guild library. Although "Thread Work Unraveled" has been on our shelves for some time (published in 2009), it hasn't been borrowed for years. If you are piecing or appliqueing, this book is full of valuable information.

As the title indicates, thread is the main focus. We have probably all had threads break (especially metallic), tension problems or dissatisfaction when the thread didn't show up as you had hoped when machine quilting. The author explains cotton thread weights and plies and provides a chart of the advantages and disadvantages of rayon and synthetic threads. Beware, nylon is not a winner! Needles, the next topic are as important as thread as they go 'hand in hand'. Clear explanations concerning the best needle for the thread you are planning to use are given with an interesting observation. To quote: "Remember that metallic thread is partly metal, the needle is all metal and metal conducts heat! If you suddenly start having problems, simply swap out the needle in the machine for a cool, fresh needle. Let the warm needle cool before using later".

Thirdly, of course, the sewing machine is important. Proper threading, balanced tension and whether your thread feeds from a horizontal or vertical position results in success or failure. At least ninety percent of all tension issues can be solved by adjusting the needle tension. 'Diagnosing the problem' is interesting - perhaps your fabric has a finish which wreaks havoc with your tension - who would have considered that?

I'd like to thank Gladys Schmidt again for bringing 'ergonomics' to our attention. Photos on page 38 demonstrate how NOT to sit at the machine. Without paying attention to our posture, do we realize the strain we put on our neck and shoulders?

Stabilizers, important in art quilting, are cleverly explained using a chart. Marking tools come with a warning - yellow pigment in both chalk and pencils is very difficult to remove. Beware! Applique (by machine) is likely something we have all done. Other than using satin stitch or buttonhole stitch, how many of us have tried a decorative stitch when attaching the applique?

A chapter on machine quilting covers all aspects from backing, batting to basting and setting up for quilting. A lot of photos explain how thread blends in or accentuates a motif. What about creating shadows when needed? No need to worry abut the thread police insisting all stitches be the same size. For effect you may wish to emphasize something with larger or smaller stitches.

Finally, a few projects wrap up this book. The author has covered her topic very well. She has done a lot of testing and given us the results, whether successful or not. We can all learn from this 'pro' and save ourselves time and frustration.







CAMP HOMEWOOD RETREAT

Sign up now for our next retreat scheduled for February 13th – 17th, 2019.


This will be a *four* day retreat which provides us with lots of valued time for sewing and socializing. **Please note this retreat will run from 11am Wednesday to 11am Sunday.** Sign up will start at the **December** business meeting. If you do not feel you can attend for a full four days please do not let that deter you from registering as it is a possibility for some of you to attend for three days only.

Depending on sign-up numbers we will also have the option of opening up the guesthouse for more private rooms. For further details concerning the guesthouse please speak to one of the retreat coordinators listed below. The cost per individual for the *four* days will range from \$265 to \$349, depending on the room you choose. The starting range of \$265 includes the three non-updated private rooms in the guesthouse, as well as bunkstyle dorm rooms in the main lodge which sleep up to 7. However on average there are usually anywhere from 2 to 5 in these rooms. Individuals in these rooms have shared bathroom/shower facilities. There is a separate handicapped washroom available to any that may require ease of access to toilet or shower. There are also newer rooms available which sleep up to 3 and have their own washroom, including shower/tub. These rooms are either \$293 with 3 sharing the room or \$307 with only 2 sharing.



All prices include 3 meals a day along with snacks in the evening consisting of cookies/squares, fruit, coffee, tea, and hot chocolate. The meals at Camp Homewood are excellent . . . and you will never walk away hungry!

Miss Fussy Cut will be most happy to answer any of your sewing and quilting questions. You'll find her mail jar on one of the shelves in the storage room.

Dear Miss Fussy Cut,

I have a question about pre-washing fabric that I am making a quilt with. When I buy a commercially made quilt in the store, I can just use it and then when I need to wash it, throw it in the washer and dryer. I've never had a problem with those quilts.

However, they are not as nice as the handmade quilts. I'm new to quilting and have been told to wash all my fabric before I make the quilt in case the dye 'runs'. Are the store-bought quilts all made with prewashed fabric? It doesn't look like it to me.

Why are people telling me to make sure to prewash? It just seems like an awful lot of extra work. And then how do I pre-wash a layer cake of fabric? Or charm squares? If I don't wash them first, how can I avoid the dye running?

Thank you, New Quilter

Dear New Quilter,

Your concerns about pre-washing fabrics are very valid. This is a question that many quilters are on the fence about.

You never really know exactly what kind of batting or fabric is being used in some of the store bought quilts out there. Like any new fabric items in the stores, you never know which ones may bleed and or shrink. I have seen store bought quilts that have shrunk a few inches when sent to the dry cleaners so that they no longer fit the bed.

Some quilters never pre-wash any fabrics because they like the sizing left in the fabrics while piecing. Others will pre-wash everything before making their "heirloom" quilts because they do not want to take

a chance on bleeding or the shrinkage. It is your option to lay them flat to dry, or toss them into the dryer and let them take on their own personality.

Now as for your pre cuts...NO! Don't ever toss them into the washer or you will have a handful of frayed scraps. If you want to pre-wash or do a colour check I would suggest that you do it in a sink or basin and gently soak by hand. Then let them air dry.

One other thought on pre-washing and the 'extra work' would be just what type of quilt you are planning to make: scrap, two colour, whole cloth. The number of hours you will put into making and quilting your quilt will not compare to the time it takes to pre-wash and iron before starting your project.

I am a little concerned if she is hiding a drinking problem.

She is a good friend but how do I question her on this?

Dear Miss Worried & Concerned,

I don't think you have anything to worry about. She was making her own spray starch!

To make your own, mix one part vodka and 2 parts water. Put the mixture in spray bottle, give it a shake and spray & iron.

Apricot Coconut French Toast (8 servings)

Submitted by Careen Webber

This is an excellent "make-ahead" brunch or breakfast dish for Christmas or New Year. Any leftovers can be re-heated for 15 seconds per slice in the microwave. Enjoy!

Remember you can substitute almond milk for real milk, Splenda for sugar, and gluten free bread for the regular loaf. Any bread can be substituted.

½ cup chopped, dried apricots
2/3 cup flaked coconut
7 eggs
1/2 cup water
1 tsp vanilla
16 slices French bread or baguette (1 inch thick)
maple syrup to serve

1/4 cup sugar 1 3/4 cups milk 1/4 cup butter, melted 1 1/4 tsp cinnamon pinch of salt

- 1. In a small microwave-safe bowl, heat apricots and water for 2 minutes. Let stand 5 minutes and drain.
- 2. Pour melted butter into a 15 inch x 10 inch x 1 inch baking pan, and tilt to coat the bottom with butter.
- 3. Sprinkle with coconut and apricots. Combine sugar and cinnamon and sprinkle this over the fruit.
- 4. In a large shallow bowl, whisk the eggs, milk, vanilla and salt. Dip bread into the egg mixture, soak for 1 min. Place slices close together over coconut mixture. (Pour any extra egg mixture over the top). Cover with cling film and refrigerate over night.
- 5. Remove from refrigerator 30 mins before baking. Bake in a pre-heated 375 degree oven for 20 25 minutes or until golden brown.

Serve with maple syrup.







Heart-Shaped Needle Nannie

Foundation Paper Piecing Pattern (Makes 2 needle cases)

- 1. Materials: 1 fat quarter, two 8"x8" pieces of batting, 1 yd ¼" ribbon, 2 beads
- 2. Print two copies of the pattern.
- 3. Trim the foundation pieces along the dotted lines.
- 4. Divide one fat quarter of fabric into four pieces 9 X 11".
- 5. Place two of the fabric pieces right sides together and pin the large pattern on top
- 6. Push a pin through the green dots and mark them on the wrong side of the bottom fabric.
- 7. Use a short stitch-length to stitch the curved edge on the foundation, pivoting at each of the 8 points.
- 8. Carefully remove the foundation paper without ripping stitches.
- 9. Trim ¼" from the stitching line and clip in to the points.
- 10. Pull the pieces of fabric apart and slash between the two green dots on one side only.
- 11. Fuse a 1" x 2 ½ " piece of paper-backed fusible web to the other wrong side.
- 12. Do not remove the paper from the fusible web.
- 13. Turn the needle case inside out through the slash and carefully press the curves around the edge.
- 14. Reach in through the slash to remove the paper from the fusible web.
- 15. Steam press through all layers to fuse the slash closed.
- 16. Edge stitch around the curved edge.
- 17. Make eyelet buttonholes as indicated on the pattern.
- 18. Pin the small pattern piece to a single layer of batting and cut out around the curved edge.
- 19. Transfer the red and blue lines from the pattern to the batting.
- 20. Centre the batting over the slashed side of the needle case and pin all layers together.
- 21. Stitch along the marked lines from edge to edge.
- 22. With the batting on the outside, fold the needle case in half along the red line. Steam press the fold.
- 23. Fold the needle case in half along one blue line with the batting on the inside. Steam press the fold.
- 24. Repeat step 20 along the other blue line.
- 25. Cut a piece of ¼ inch ribbon 18 inches long and slip a bead halfway along the ribbon.
- 26. Thread both ends of the ribbon on a darning needle and draw through the two eyelets.
- 27. Knot the ends together.
- 28. Slip the beaded loop through the knotted end of the ribbon.

Sewing Machines Beverly Michaluk

Bring to January meeting
