


CELEBRATE!

A Message from Canada

One of my most treasured possessions is my Grandmother's recipe book.

Now, before you all say "Awww", this is NOT a copy of 'Mrs. Beaton's Household Hints' or any other published work. It is a hodge podge of handwritten recipes, clippings from magazines, primarily one called 'The Peoples Friend', now celebrating its 150th anniversary; typewritten pages by persons unknown; and all loosely collected, and mostly pasted into, of all things, an old science notebook of my mother's. Oh yes, it is interspersed with pages from an old "Lofty Peak Flour" recipe book, and all loosely held together in a plastic bag. The Lofty Peak recipe book has suffered. It is coming apart and judging by the coil scorch marks on parts of it, the cooking was done on an electric stove! Every now and then there will be writing continuing from under a pasted recipe stating "The properties of Magnesium.... "or similar. If the recipe is in my mother's handwriting, this continuation of the actual science notes can be disconcerting.

I was reading though this the other day, and was struck by its age. Many of the recipes are from before WW II, and many more were written during it, as there is mention of eggless cakes and adapting recipes for dried egg powder. The "A Message from Canada" title caught my eye. One side of this scrap of paper has three or four recipes printed on it, and the other has the following:

It then goes on to tell you how to reconstitute the dried egg:

"A Message from Canada"

This package contains five ounces of Canadian Grade A dried eggs – approximately one dozen shell eggs.

They have been dried by a specially developed spray process, packaged to retain freshness and food value.

Nothing has been added, and only the shells and water have been removed. Restore the water and you can use them as you would whole, fresh eggs for baking, in puddings and as scrambled eggs or omelettes, and other egg dishes."

1 level tablespoon of dried egg plus 2 tablespoons of water equals 1 fresh egg. And hints on using them in recipes.


All this was before I was born, or even thought of, but I do find it fascinating. Canadians sent parcels of food to the UK, not even knowing who they were going to. Some parcels addressed to the mayor of a town, others to a church. And then there were also the quilts that Lynda Reid wrote about.

BOOK REVIEW by Lois Warner

Improvising Tradition - 18 Quilted Projects using Strips, Slices, and Strata
Alexandra Legerwood
Interweave Press
Guild Library # 634

Many of us are traditional quilters. We like to have a pattern to follow and have an idea of the end results. As an opposite to this approach, improvisational quilting is more creative, requiring you to work largely without a pattern, but with an overall goal in mind. "Improvising Tradition" takes both these quilting methods and combines them into some stunning projects.



How does the author do this? By taking a traditional pattern such as Log Cabin or Pyramids, made in the usual way, but with a twist. Perhaps the Log Cabin has a centre block which is offset with varying widths of 'logs', or the Log Cabin can be made 'wonky' by twisting the block pieces. By creating new fabric from strips and strata, traditional pieces may be cut.

There are three main sections in the book: Creating with Strips (7 projects are included), Creating with Strata (5 projects follow) and Creating with Slice and Insert (6 projects follow). If you are a beginner to improvisational quilting, rest easy, as all the projects give complete cutting and piecing directions, as well as a material list and finished size. Creating the fabric from strips/strata is the key to making these 'improvisational'.


Very clear instructions are given concerning ways to sew strips together which can then be used as 'yardage' to cut the particular shapes needed. See the "Falling Leaves" table runner on page 37. What a stunning autumn table decoration! The Log Cabin blocks are very versatile, used in both a modern baby quilt and again in a stunning male lap quilt.

Strata usually refers to strips of various widths sewn together into panels which are then cut apart and recombined. The author goes one step further by piecing together random bits of fabric to create a new, larger piece of fabric which is unique - much like crazy quilting. Fabric pieces are sewn together at random, trimmed to fit until you reach the desired size. Trim accurately and you have your own piece of "strata". The strata can be monochromatic (as in "Nesting Squares" page 75) or an assortment of colors ("Jewel Box coasters page 70). Strata can be used any way you would use regular fabric.

Section 3 covers "Creating with Slice - and - Insert". From straight cutting and inserting fussy cut fabric, to slicing fabric and adding angled pieces, to cutting gentle curves in the fabric and adding contrasting fabric, the instructions seem failproof. Tips are found throughout, but again, material lists and clear diagrams and directions are found for each project.

Finally, all projects in this book were quilted by the author on her home sewing machine. She offers tips for quilting at home, rather than sending your projects out to be done on a long arm. As she says "......there is a lot of satisfaction to be had from making a quilt yourself from start to finish". Your quilt will be truly yours!

Thumbs up for this book!



Dear Miss Fussy Cut,

Do you ever long for the '60s when we'd just hack the bottom off our jeans and let the fray fly?

I hate hemming pants, especially jeans. I'm fine until I get to the seams and then my machine jams, or my needle breaks, or the stitches are a mess.

I know that these young hipsters nowadays just roll up the cuffs of their jeans. I've certainly got the

hips, but, I still like my pants to looked properly hemmed! Please help!

Dear Happy Hemmer:

There three solutions to your under-height problem:

- 1. Get higher heels on your shoes.
- 2. Get the hammer and go to the garage floor and give the thick sections at the seams a couple of really good whacks that helps flatten them down.
- 3. You can get a little piece (often comes with your machine parts) called a seam jumper. Fit this just in front of your presser foot and ease your stitching forward then place it behind the foot to keep the pressure and stitches even.

I hope this helps you get the 'perfect' hemmed look!

Carol Metner's SOFT GINGER COOKIES

(With optional white chocolate)

2 1/4 cups all purpose flour

1 tsp baking powder

1/2 tsp salt

1/2 cup +3 Tbsp fine white sugar, divided

2 tsp ground ginger

1 tsp ground cinnamon

1/4 tsp ground cloves

1/4 tsp ground nutmeg

3/4 cup unsalted butter, softened

1/2 cup golden yellow sugar, packed

1 large egg

1/4 cup fancy molasses

2 tsp vanilla extract

3 cups white chocolate chips

2 Tbsp shortening

holly berry quins to decorate

- 1. In a mixing bowl, whisk together flour, baking soda, salt, ginger, cinnamon, cloves & nutmeg, until combined. Set aside.
- 2. Using electric mixer, cream together butter, 1/2 cup fine white sugar and yellow sugar until combined.
- 3. Add egg, then molasses and vanilla. At a low speed, add dry ingredients until combined. Cover bowl with plastic and chill for 1 hour.
- 4. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.
- 5. Scoop 1 1/2 Tbsp of dough per cookie, shape into balls. (optional: roll in fine white sugar)
- 6. Transfer balls to silicone baking mat or parchment paper lined baking sheet, spacing about 2" apart and flatten tops evenly.
- 7. Bake for 10-12 minutes
- 8. Move to wire rack to cool.
- Optional: In a microwave safe bowl, melt white chocolate with shortening in 10 second intervals, stirring until melted. Dip half of each cookie in melted chocolate then run edge of the cookie along the side of the bowl to remove any excess chocolate.


Optional - Add holly berry quins to each cookie while chocolate is still warm, then place decorated cookie onto parchment paper to set at room temperature. (Note: if the bowl of melted chocolate begins to harden while dipping cookies, return to the microwave and gently heat until melted again.)





ROAD TRIP!

I thought some feedback on the shops I visited might be helpful and several guild members asked if I would share the list. I found each shop had a different "flavour" and had generally created their own niche. Most sold fabric at \$12 a yard. Appliqué, wool appliqué and embroidery were front and center in a lot of shops. And panels! Every shop had a good variety. I have "starred" my favourites, going south from the Oregon border.

- * Homespun Quilts, Astoria A good variety of fabric, patterns and notions. There is also a separate room of yarn and related.
- * Center Diamond, Cannon Beach a great variety of fabric, books, patterns and notions. Lots of "coastal" and other themed fabric.

Swift Stitches, Garibaldi – a small shop with the focus on the owner created appliqué patterns and kits. Generally these are coastal/Oregon themed. The samples I saw were machine appliquéd. Some batiks and Kona solids were stocked. The Kona solids were priced at \$8 a yard.

- **Jane's Fabric Patch, Tillamook Wow! 6,000 bolts of fabric, books, patterns, notions, supplies, craft and quilt kits. Well set out with separate rooms for holidays and embroidery.
- *BJ's Fabrics & Quilts, Cloverdale 4,000 bolts of fabric. A smaller shop that the owner has made the most of. Fabulous kits and samples. I found some original Laurel Burch fabric here.

Quilter's Cove, Newport – good variety of different batiks. Appliqué rules here, many McKenna Ryan patterns and coastal themed selections.

Coyote Creek Quilts, Newport – this tiny shop had just opened, next to Pirate's Plunder in the south part of Newport across the bridge. I found an original Laurel Burch holiday panel here. Eclectic and it will be interesting to see this shop once they are truly set up. (Not on the list)

Family Fabrics, Waldport – friendly, helpful and a thoroughly delightful shop. Good variety all around. A group of local guild members were busy cutting fabric for comfort quilts when I was there.

Wenz-Daze Quilter's Emporium, Florence – a smaller shop with a variety of fabric, patterns and notions.

Threads That Bind, Coos Bay – small shop with a good variety of fabric, patterns and notions. A number of the patterns are from local designers.

Kruusn Quilt Designs, Coos Bay – small shop that does a lot. The owner has designed a lot of her own patterns and carries an interesting variety of fabric and notions. (Not on the list)

This is as far south as we went on this trip.

Unintended Messages

Recently a friend of ours was working on a project when someone felt the need to give her some unsolicited advice. Maybe the advisor meant well, but the advice didn't come across as helpful. The opposite happened. It sent a very negative message and our friend felt very discouraged.

I get that.

My mother taught me how to use her Singer 319W when I was still in elementary school. In doing so, she gave me two things; an interest in sewing, and an enduring fascination with sewing machines. I soon learned how to put together pieces of fabric and how to take apart a sewing machine. (I also learned a stressful lesson in how to put one back together before she got home from work!) Now I share my wife's interest in fabric, and sewing, and quilting.

In the process, I get a whole lot of unintended messages.

It mostly happens in stores. Fabric stores. We'll go in together and wander around looking at things and before too long, a staff member will tell me where there's a chair to sit in. I'm sure they just worry that I might be bored, but I can't shake the feeling that I'm viewed more as an unsupervised toddler than as a customer.

It's worse if I go in a fabric store alone. No sooner has my foot crossed the threshold than a voice from the back of the store shouts at me. When I look up past two customers leaning on the cash desk and toward the three standing in line at the cutting table, all waiting for help themselves and now staring at me, it doesn't feel good. The voice may be saying, "Can I help you find something?" but what I hear is more like a panicked cry to emergency dispatch. "One-Adam-Twelve, we have a lone male entering a fabric shop with no apparent purpose. Requesting backup." It makes me feel like a high schooler on his lunch break being hawk-eyed by mall security.

I got quite a clear message once in a yarn shop in the US. My wife and I were both browsing when I was accosted by the clerk and informed that, "There is a "Lumpy's" next door." At first I suspected that the clerk had taken her cues from my waistline and decided I probably wanted food, not yarn. Then it crossed my mind that Lumpy's might be a bar and maybe I looked like I could use a cocktail. But, as I glanced out the window, it all became clear. Lumpy's is a golf store. Golf! A sport I play once a decade, max! Nevertheless, the message to me was clear. "Get out!" I went and sat in the car.

In all my adult working years, one of the lessons I learned over, and over again is that it is not what you intend to say that matters, it's what your audience hears. It didn't matter that someone was sharing what she thought was a better method for what our friend was doing. That's not the message that came across. Her response to the message was, "Well, I guess I'm not good enough."

For me, the worst case happened at a quilt show. It was in a small hall and the attendance was light. We'd viewed the quilts and inevitably got to the vendors around the edge. As my wife wandered ahead into a booth, I spied a bin of thimbles that looked like they might be large enough for me to be comfortable. As soon as I followed her in, the booth owner literally shrieked, "Ooooo, there's a man...in my booth!"

Probably I'm the only one who heard what she actually shouted, "Hey everybody, look at the freak!"



Quilters is a musical with a book by Molly Newman and Barbara Damashek, and lyrics and music by Barbara Damashek. It is about the lives of American pioneer women based on the book The Quilters:Women and Domestic Art by Patricia Cooper and Norma Bradley Allen. The show was originally developed and produced by the Denver Center Theater Company, Brockman Seawell, executive producer. It had a brief run on Broadway in 1984.





The **quilting bee** was an extremely popular social event in the mid-nineteenth century. The **quilting bee** provided a social space for women to gather and gossip while they simultaneously expressed their artistic capabilities.
