


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A Fibre Artist's Guide to Color & Design, the basics & beyond

Heather Thomas Landauer Publishing LLC 2011 Quilt Guild Library #523

Here is an excellent book which is composed of hundreds of color illustrations and fibre art examples. It is easy to read and understand, with clearly written text. A winner!

Color & Design is divided into a section first on color, then design, and finishes with 12 workshops combining both color and design. Colorful examples and illustrations are used throughout the book, with samples of work by fibre artists demonstrating the concepts which are being discussed. The book is engaging and keeps your attention!



Color is the first topic covered. The Language of Color explains the color wheel as well as its history and uses. Did you realize that scientifically speaking, color doesn't really exist? Color is human interpretations of vibrations in the atmosphere - our minds create color as a means of comprehending these vibrations - look at page 15 for more information - too technical for me! We are all aware of primary, secondary and tertiary colors, but according to this book, colors are warm or cool (yes, we all know that), but some colors are neutral temperature, between warm and cool, and can be used either way, depending on the required mood. Colors in this category are red, red-violet, green and yellow-green. By creating a tint or shade (adding white or black to the color) you can change its visual temperature and cause it to behave like the colors it is next to. For example, red beside warm colors will usually read as warm, but place it with cool colors and it will seem cooler. See pages 58 - 59 for fascinating information on color interplay. Each color is discussed (pages 24 - 50) and the author then talks about how colors work together through color combinations, dominance of colors and how complex colors are created. A 'quick key' helps to quickly explain the difference between color value and color saturation/intensity. Quick keys throughout are helpful reminders in a simplified form.

The Language of Design (pages. 78 - 131) covers Elements of design (line, shape, scale etc.) and Principles of design (balance, repetition, harmony etc.). Again the pages are filled with examples accompanied by boxes explaining the design properties illustrated in each sample. Why are some quilts so appealing to the eye? because they are balanced and don't jar our senses.

The final section, 12 Workshops (pages. 136 - 106) builds upon one another with the degree of difficulty growing in each one. To quote Heather Thomas "The piece itself is not the focal point, it is what you learn about the interaction of color, design skill and yourself that really matters". To use Workshop 2 as an example: you will deal with monochromatic quilts, exploring the use of color scale and contrast. You are given guidelines as to goals which you hope to achieve plus a review of specific color pages, pages on design contrast etc., and a quick key on color terms. Five projects by various artists illustrate monochromatic quilts with explanations accompanying each one.

This book is a treat to look through, inspirational, and a very worthwhile reference in our guild library. You may not wish to know all the information, after all it took the author years to assemble, in order to write the book, but it is easy to use as a reference for a specific question you may have on color or design. Even if you aren't in a quilting mood at the moment, this book is sure to get your creative juices flowing!

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Diabetic Fruit Cake

- 3 Cups raisins 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 2 teaspoons vanilla 1 teaspoon Baking Powder
- 2 Cups water 3/4. +/- tsp salt (none in one you tasted)

Thank you to Michelle and whoever it was that made the top.









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Community Quilts News - Myra Shearer

There is now fabric in the storage room for Community Quilt projects, as well as batting. Batting should be used cautiously – the cost of batting has risen, like everything else.

Fabric / Book Sale Feb. 16, 2023

In recent months, Community Quilts has received donations of fabric, kits and other miscellaneous items. Not all of it is suitable for Community Quilt projects, so we will be having a sale of what we can't use. There will be **terrific bargains** and some very unique, fun and colourful pieces of fabric in all sizes – from fat quarters to 4 yards. The sale will be at the hall on **February 16**, from **10:30** until about 2:00. All the money from the sale will go in the Community Quilt account and used to purchase items such as batting.

The Library Committee has done an early spring cleanout and will be selling books on Feb. 16 as well. The books will be \$1 each.

Who Do We Donate To? This is another organization that we donate quilts to

The **Comox Valley Transition Society** supports women, children and families in the Comox, Cumberland, Courtenay areas and beyond (including Denman and Hornby Islands), who are experiencing or fleeing abuse, overcoming trauma, working toward/ through recovery and those who are unsheltered and/or struggling through poverty. They operate both Lilli House and Amethyst House and offer various counselling services. Last year Community Quilts donated 125 quilts to the Transition Society. The quilts are not given out to all who use Lilli and Amethyst House, but are used for special occasions', such as a birthday, Christmas or for a child who is having a particularly difficult time.

Sandy S. is responsible for the delivery of the quilts to them – before Christmas she delivered 36 quilts that they were going to use in the hampers they were making up for the residents of Lilli House (27 adult, 8 girls, and 1 boy). Those working at the Society are always excited to receive our quilts and we have heard several stories of how receiving a quilt has made a difference, especially to the children who often arrive at the shelter without much of their own. We also have donated placemats that go into home set-up packs for when the women leave the shelters.

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CAMP HOMEWOOD RETREAT

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Still rooms available for February 22nd- 26th, 2023.

This will be a **four** day retreat which provides us with lots of valued time for sewing and socializing.

Please note this retreat will run from 11am Wednesday to 11am Sunday. Sign up will started at the **December** business meeting.

The cost per individual for the **four** days will range from \$352. to \$445., depending on the room you choose. **Please note there has been a 10% increase on daily rates.** The starting range of \$352. includes the three non-updated private rooms in the guesthouse, as well as bunk style dorm rooms in the main lodge which sleep up to 7. However on average there are usually anywhere from 2 to 5 in these rooms. Individuals in these rooms have shared bathroom/shower facilities. There is a separate handicapped washroom available to any that may require ease of access to toilet or shower. There are also newer rooms available which sleep up to 3 and have their own washroom, including shower/tub. The cost of these rooms per person will depend on how many are sharing. All prices include 3 meals a day, along with snacks in the evening consisting of cookies/squares, fruit, coffee, tea, and hot chocolate. The meals at Camp Homewood are plentiful, with lots of selections at each meal . . . you will never walk away hungry!

If you have never been to a retreat at Camp Homewood we urge you to give it a try. It is a lot of fun and a great way to get to know your fellow quilters. In the past we have seen a number of quilters who have attended retreat for the first time, and we continue to see more of them becoming regulars. Brenda Levirs showing the one block she has made from that tote of fabric at her feet, and she has the same amount of fabric at home. All fabric was purchased in 2007.


Beverly Luck who finished most of the applique on those little houses but then stopped. Now she can't find the pieces needed to finish the applique or the desire.
