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CAMP HOMEWOOD RETREAT

The time is here to sign up for our next retreat which is scheduled for February 14th – 18th, 2018.

This will be a *four* day retreat which provides us with lots of valued time for sewing and socializing. **Please note this retreat will run from 11am Wednesday to 11am Sunday.** Sign up will start at the **December** business meeting. If you do not feel you can attend for a full four days please do not let that deter you from registering as it is a possibility for some of you to attend for three days only.

Depending on sign-up numbers we will also have the option of opening up the guesthouse for more private rooms. For further details concerning the guesthouse please speak to one of the retreat coordinators listed below.

The cost per individual for the *four* days will range from \$252. to \$305., depending on the room you choose. The starting range of \$252. is a bunk style dorm room which sleeps up to 7, however on average there are usually anywhere from 2 to 5 in these rooms. Individuals in these rooms have shared bathroom/shower facilities. There is a separate handicapped washroom available to any that may require ease of access to toilet or shower. There are also newer rooms available which sleep up to 3 and have their own washroom, including shower/tub. These rooms are either \$287. with 3 sharing the room or \$305. with only 2 sharing.

All prices include 3 meals a day along with snacks in the evening consisting of cookies/squares, fruit, coffee, tea, and hot chocolate. The meals at Camp Homewood are excellent . . . and you will never walk away hungry!

If you have never been to a retreat at Camp Homewood we urge you to give it a try. It is a lot of fun and a great way to get to know your fellow quilters. Over the past couple of years we have seen a number of quilters who have attended retreat for the first time, and we continue to see more of them becoming regulars. If you wish to sign-up or for further information please contact one of the retreat

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coordinators listed below. Our contact details can be located on the guild website under "retreats" or by viewing the membership list.

For those of you who plan ahead the dates for our fall 2018 retreat are October 17th – 21st, 2018.


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Book Review

Patchwork Party

10 festive new quilts & the recipes that inspired them Sandy Bonsib C+T Publishing 2009 Quilt Guild Library #515

Desserts and quilting - do they go together? - you bet, and not just on the comfort level! Patchwork Party proves that dessert color inspirations also work well when used in quilts. The 'Lemon Blueberry Pound Cake' quilt (pg. 15) looks good enough to eat, while the 'Not Just Huckleberry Pie' quilt (pg. 52) certainly reminds you of berry shapes.



Not only are the quilts lovely to look at, but the recipes look good, too! And, one more plus, the quilts are all constructed using only four patch and half square triangles. No 'set in' patches, no trapezoids or individual triangles to be concerned about - easy as pie!

The primary focus of this book is on color. As the author says "We think quilts are great because of the colors". Color wheels and how to use them are discussed, as well as color terms, color schemes and 'value' of color. This information is presented in the first three pages, then its on to the simple blocks and 10 projects.

Each project provides notes about the color combination used, as well as hints for using the colors in the projects. Yardage and cutting instructions are provided and clear, colored diagrams show exactly how to put the quilt together. The accompanying recipe follows, as well as photos of quilts made by Sandy Bonsib's students.

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The two student challenges near the end of the book are real eye openers. 'It's a Mystery Challenge' sounds like a lot of fun! the 'Lemon Chiffon Quilt Challenge' is equally inspiring with such different results.

Color is so important in our lives. Here is a book which will likely get you seeking new color combinations. With such simple blocks, complicated looking quilts result, through the use of color.

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Get to Know Our Guild Members

Meet Guild Member - Sandra Longland

I am one of those rare Valley girls, born and raised in Comox. Second of five children, my youth was busy with family and lessons. Active with swimming, dancing and figure skating lessons, and participating in festivals, competitions and exams.

Before graduating from GP Vanier, I started working for my Dad's trucking business as the bookkeeper. After graduation, I worked at Searle's Shoes on 5th Street, and after five years transferred to their Naturalizer Shoe Store in Woodgrove Centre, Nanaimo as manager. Eighteen years in the shoe business, led to a change of career and pursuit of the Accountant dream started in high school. Two years at Malaspina College before transferring into Certified General Accounting program while working full time resulted in CGA designation obtained in 2004.

In 2010, after the end of a long relationship and death of my youngest brother, I returned to the Comox Valley and closer to family. My next big change came after fifteen years of working in Public Practice, when the opportunity to switch to an industry accounting position came up.
