Last general meeting held May 4, we had a guest, Christine Colbert, from the Comox Valley Hospice Society. She gave a short speech to make us aware of the society's mission and how we, as a quilt guild, may help them.

Including six care beds for those who have a palliative diagnosis, they also provide counselling for the patients, companionship, support groups, educational resources and spiritual/prayer support as well, support groups for the caregivers and the bereaved.

The maximum funding this Society receives from the Federal Gov. is \$19,000. Any further funds are secured through fund raising. This is where we come in. Christine attended the Seniors Resources show in Cumberland, in February, at which we also had a table to show-case the CVSHQG. She was quite impressed with all the work we do especially through our Community Quilts program. She approached us with a request to put forward to our membership.

The Hospice Society is celebrating it's 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary this November. This is also an opportunity for them to fund raise. They have asked us if we would make and donate, decorative heart shaped ornaments which they would hang on a tree and sell to event goers, as keepsakes in memory of passed loved ones. We all have those small pieces of fabric and decorations waiting to be used up and what a perfect opportunity.

The support in the room at the meeting, seemed pretty overwhelming and so we as the guild, shall endeavour to make and donate what we can.

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The Hearts are not specific in dimension, design or colour. Average size would be about 5-6". Decorate them tastefully as you see fit. We have batting to stuff them, and the Society will supply ribbon bearing their logo, to string them on for hanging. Some of our members have already started making these hearts as shown at the meeting May 4<sup>th</sup>.

Once again, Comox Valley Schoolhouse Quilters Guild makes a difference in our community! Yeah team!

With a difference from our usual Bee blocks - each quilter won't be doing one or two blocks.

Why?

Block construction is done by whacking into a stack of twelve 14 inch squares.

So Quilters will instead take turns working on the same scrappy stack of 12. There will be 4 or more stacks moving through the room.

Are you curious? Then come join in on June 22 and find out more!

You can bring one or two 14 inch squares which dance with this cheerful child's colourway.



We will likely create at least four child size flimsies.

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### Community Quilts News - June 2023

Community Quilts has had a very successful year, with many donations to the organizations that we support. In order to fund these projects, we held a raffle in the fall and a fabric sale in February. The money raised from these enabled us to purchase batting and materials used to make the breast cancer kits.

There are 30 Breast Cancer Comfort Kits ready to be delivered to Breast Cancer Support in late June.

Deliveries to other groups will probably not resume until the fall. Until then, we will store any quilts we are given until they are needed.

After the request in the May newsletter for anyone willing to quilt flimsies, we have had several members volunteer to do this – thank you.

There are still breast cancer kits still available in the storage locker at the hall.

There is batting available for Community Quilt projects also in the storage locker and another roll is expected to arrive at the end of June.

Any quilts that are for us can still be left in the basket in the hall, although pickup of these might be a little sporadic during the summer.

I want to thank all the members who have supported Community Quilts this year – whether by making quilts and Breast Cancer Kits, buying raffle tickets and fabric, or donating your leftover bits of batting. It is very important to the success of Community Quilts and is VERY MUCH APPRECIATED!

And please buy some basket raffle tickets from Theresa – all the money raised will be used in Community Quilts projects.


**Senior Quilts** – are a smaller size because they are easier to use with a wheelchair, and are given to women and men.

Does anyone have EQ7 or EQ8? EQ stands for Electric Quilt, a design program you download to your PC, Mac, or Laptop; where you can design your own Blocks and Quilts with a click of your mouse.

If you can click a <u>'mouse'</u> you can use this software.

The math is done for you.

You will get exact cutting requirements and yardage of fabrics needed.

Create pieced blocks or applique blocks, the sky is the limit.

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#### May Program Presentation: All About Scraps

#### Scrap Management: Clare Ireson

Following on from the Scrap Management presentation at our May business meeting, these are the sources that gave me a starting point for processing my leftover fabric pieces and scraps. Karen Brown of Just Get it Done Quilts

(<u>www.justgetitdonequilts.com</u>) has several excellent YouTube videos on scrap management: 10-15 minutes full of ideas, information and inspiration. My other source was 'How I organize all my scraps' on *Tiffany's Quilting Life* YouTube channel. It was a long and detailed video, but she got right to business. She processes a lot of fabric, so she has to be efficient.

Scrap management involves a purpose and a process. Think about how you like to quilt. What blocks do you want to make to use up the scraps? What size blocks do you like to work with? What pre cuts do you use? Which pre cuts do you never use?

I liked the idea of setting a timer, and planning an afternoon a month to work on a pile of fabric. Start by sorting by size, iron everything, straighten edges. Decide what will be the smallest size pieces you will keep and use.

Keep it simple and consistent. Once you've sorted out the larger pieces, cut scraps into 2-4 sized strips (e.g. 5" and 2.5" strips) or blocks (e.g. 3", 6" and 10") that work for you. Think about storing fabric as light/dark, warm/cool as well as colour.

#### **Quilts from Scraps and Scrap Management: Sharon Hansen**

Making a quilt with scraps is so satisfying and can really let you be creative. One suggestion I have is to pick a block like Jacobs Ladder or Churn Dash or split nine patch and make a few at a time and soon you will have enough blocks for a quilt either for charity or someone special. One of my favourites is the Mocha Swirl block in Scrap Basket Surprises, it only takes 2 fabrics in 2.5" strips for each block and you will be surprised how quickly you can get a few blocks sewn up.

Organizing by cutting your scraps into often used sizes: 5" and 2 1/2" strips, 10" squares, 5" and 2 1/2" squares. When they are organized by size it's easier to see what you have and the cutting is already done so you are ready to sew.

I also like to organize my scraps by color, themes, and designer. ie: children's, sports, Xmas, Fall/ Halloween.

I also organize by different types of fabric, cotton, batiks, flannels.

I have found several books that have given me inspiration to use up my scraps:

Simple Strategies for Block Swap Quilts #375 in our library.

Nickel Quilts and More Nickel Quilts - using 5" squares - in our library,

Scrap Basket Surprises and Scrap Basket Sensations by Kim Brackett in our library

Cut the Scraps, by Joan Ford

The quilts I displayed were Northern Comfort and Beach Cottage by Kim Brackett, and Road to Pineberry Trail by Holly Taylor for Moda, (also called Road to Oklahoma). Blocks were Northern Comfort and Mocha Swirl.

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# **CAMP HOMEWOOD RETREAT**

### Our next retreat is scheduled for October 18<sup>th</sup> – 22nd, 2023.

## Sign-up will start at the June business meeting.

The cost per individual for the *four* days will range from \$340. to \$432., depending on the room you choose. These rates are currently an approximation as there is generally a rate increase each year starting with the October retreat.

The starting range includes the three non-updated private rooms in the guesthouse, as well as bunk style dorm rooms in the main lodge which sleep up to 7. However on average there are usually anywhere from 2 to 5 in these rooms. Individuals in these rooms have shared bathroom/shower facilities.

There is a separate handicapped washroom available to any that may require ease of access to toilet or shower.

There are also newer rooms available which sleep up to 3 and have their own washroom, including shower/tub. The cost of these rooms per person will depend on how many are sharing.

All prices include 3 meals a day, along with snacks in the evening consisting of cookies/squares, fruit, coffee, tea, and hot chocolate. The meals at Camp Homewood are plentiful, with lots of selections at each meal . . . you will never walk away hungry!

If you have never been to a retreat at Camp Homewood we urge you to give it a try. It is a lot of fun and a great way to get to (Continued on page 23)

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know your fellow quilters. In the past we have seen a number of quilters who have attended retreat for the first time, and we continue to see more of them becoming regulars.

Sheila Scrase recalls the very first Hands Across the Water held in 1989:

I was recently taking a trip down memory lane and I was inspired, once again, by my affiliation with such a wonderful pursuit as quilting. Our guild, in its infancy, realized there were many fellow quilters out there seeking information and inspiration regarding quilts. Our own guild members met at the Lake Trail Jr. Secondary school and were producing wonderful quilts. We began to wonder what other groups were doing; so one day I suggested we invite Powell River over for lunch and a Show and Tell. They were delighted and accepted the invitation. We provided the main course and they brought the cookies. There was no cost involved as I could open and close my rooms as the need arose. The display was in the textile room and the lunch was served in the foods room. It was great. Everyone was picked up and returned to the ferry; so from the moment they stepped foot on our side and the ritual handshakes took place, what has become a tradition was born - Hands Across the Water.


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## Positively Postcards...Quilted Keepsakes to Save or Send

With summer fast approaching, who wants to be sewing a full size quilt? Why not try some postcard size quilts...they are small (4" x 6"), easy on your fabric stash, quick to make, portable, allow you to experiment, fun to make - what more could you want?

Fibre postcards fall into two categories, mailable fibre postcards and quilted postcards. Mailable postcards are made with the intention of being sent without an envelope and have a stiff



inner core. Most often, these postcards are used as exchange cards within an organized group of 5 to 25 people and the stamps and postmarks are part of their appeal.

The second type of fibre postcards are 4" x 6" mini quilts with the look and feel of larger quilts. This type of postcard must be mailed in an envelope so the thickness and types of embellishments are only limited by your imagination. These mini quilts may also be turned into greeting cards or may be framed. Again, this type of postcard may be traded - a lovely reminder of another quilter and their work.

"Positively Postcards" is set out in an easy to follow order. A section on tools and supplies is followed by another chapter of general instructions for making quilted postcards. First rule? Have fun! You don't need to square up corners and have precise measurements...let your creativity bloom. To quote the authors "each experience of making a quilted postcard teaches us something and better equips us to tackle new creative-design challenges in the future".

Basic information on selecting fabrics for the postcard base is followed by directions for fussy cutting and fusing novelty prints. A fabric frame could enhance the featured "picture" on your postcard. Of course, embellishments on the postcards make them very special! Ribbon, quilting with special threads, buttons and beads all find places on quilted postcards ensuring they are "one of a kind". Since the authors expect you to use your own imagination and creativity, there is only one sample project to send you on your way. This project shows you how to make a quilted postcard, from start to finish. Very clear, full size color photos of the process insures you won't get lost.

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Finally, a wonderful postcard gallery fills out the remainder of this book. Beginning with the first technique of using a novelty print for the postcard base, examples are given with descriptions of how the postcards were made. Fussy cut novelty prints (technique 3) are a lot of fun to view.

Note the use of beads and a charm added to Jeremiah Bullfrog (page 61). Fabric frames (technique 4) add a touch of elegance while postcards designed with vintage hankies (technique 5) bring us back to another use for those lovely lacey bits which are no longer used since Kleenex took over.

This book has been fun to review. I hope some of us will make fabric postcards on those hot, sunny summer days we are all looking forward to.



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
