Please contact Mary Lou Morden by the May meeting to indicate your desire to attend and to pay her the \$15.00 fee.



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Book Review

kool kaleidoscope Quilts
Ricky Tims Simple strip piecing techniques for stunning results
C+T Publishing 2010
Quilt Guild library #593

The name "Ricky Tims" is very familiar to quilters, especially those who have made one of his convergence quilts. He is also an accomplished musician, but says that he found 'fame and joy' in quilting. As with Alison Glass of the February book report, he too encourages quilters to take risks with their own work to get to "the next level" of personal achievement. Ricky has certainly tried many different types of quilts in his career, but this book is specifically on making kaleidoscope quilts using



strip piecing. If you thought this quilt would be too difficult to attempt, look at pages 6 and 7 - only 15 steps and your quilt top is finished!

Well, perhaps not that easy! First is the key concept "Choose the fabrics that you like, and let it happen". Selecting appropriate fabrics for the strata (cut into wedges to form the centre), border and binding is important. Although the finished quilt may be a surprise, you want it to reflect your color ideas and be pleasing to your eye.

Creating the strata and creating your pattern come next. Complete directions as well as information about enlarging or reducing your kool kaleidoscope follows. The student's quilt on page 59 is a good example of how the pattern has been both reduced and enlarged to create a 43" x 59" quilt.

Using your templates, the strata is now cut and the pieces are placed on a design wall. Out pops the centre of the kaleidoscope! Butts and wedges (fillers to com-

plete the empty spaces left by the centre's angles) are cut and put in place to complete the centre. A good section on assembling the wedges follows (those are the angled pieces cut from your strata which have been sewn together). Finally, the borders are added, the quilt is quilted and bound, then hung up to be admired.

The Gallery of quilts is a wealth of information. Twenty six quilts made by Ricky's students are shown. "Each quilt is accompanied by remarks from it's maker, followed by a brief comment from me (Ricky Tims), stating what I found especially notable about that particular quilt". There is also a detail of each quilt to enable you to identify the wedge as the basis for the design. Notice how each wedge design is different, depending on how the quilter divided up her wedge into templates - the result - each quilt is unique. This is an interesting concept for the construction of this sort of quilt. With good, clear instructions from a master quilter, think about trying it!

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CAMP HOMEWOOD RETREAT October 19 thru 23rd 2016

So excited to advise all of you that our next Camp Homewood retreat has been scheduled for *four* days, providing us with one additional day of sewing and socializing. It will run from Wednesday through Sunday, October $19^{th} - 23^{rd}$, 2016. Sign up for the October retreat will be at the **June** business meeting with a \$50. deposit due upon registration. If you do not feel you can attend for a full four days please do not let that deter you from registering as it may be a possibility for some of you to attend for three days only.

Depending on sign-up numbers we may also have the option of opening up the guesthouse for more private rooms. For further details concerning the guesthouse please speak to one of the retreat coordinators listed below. We do not have the exact cost at this time as the fees are re-evaluated yearly for the fall/spring retreats. We have been advised that the cost will most likely only increase by a couple of dollars. With the current cost structure the cost per individual for the *four* days would range from \$215. to \$267., depending on the room you choose. The starting range of \$215 is a bunk style dorm room which sleeps up to 7, however on average there are usually anywhere from 3 – 5 in these rooms. Individuals in these rooms have shared bathroom/shower facilities. There is a separate handicapped washroom available to any that may require ease of access to toilet or shower. There are also newer rooms available which sleep up to 3 and have their own washroom, including shower/tub. These rooms are either \$250 with 3 sharing the room or \$267 with only 2 sharing. All prices include 3 meals a day along with snacks in the evening consisting of cookies/squares, fruit, coffee, tea, and hot chocolate. The meals at Camp Homewood are excellent . . . and you will never walk away hungry!

If you have never been to a retreat at Camp Homewood we urge you to give it a try. It is a lot of fun and a great way to get to know your fellow quilters. Most quilters who have attended previous retreats become regulars. If you wish to sign-up or for further information please contact one of the retreat coordinators listed below.

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WORKSHOP NEWS

Thanks to all of you who support the workshop program by taking classes!! Remember, we are always open to hearing your suggestions!

To that end, we'll have our suggestion container, our rose bouquet pens and slips of paper at the next meeting so you can give us even more great ideas. And, you can always email one of us if you think of something you'd like to learn in the meantime!

Our last class for this year, Raelene's Wallet Class, took place on April 23rd. It was a great day of precision cutting and sewing. Raelene is offering a follow-up in the afternoon on May 5th, a Thursday sewing day and also our meeting day.

Here's the much requested recipe from last weekend. This is a really quick and easy recipe, is gluten free, fat free, dairy free.....unfortunately not sugar free!

WORKSHOP HAYSTACKS – Makes about 12 large Haystacks

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line a cookie sheet with parchment paper.

Measure the following ingredients into a large bowl:

180 ml sugar

370 ml UNSWEETENED coconut, any length – do not use sweetened

2 large egg whites (60 ml)

5 ml vanilla extract

a couple of pinches of salt

Using your hands, mix well, completely combining the ingredients.

Form 'haystacks', each about 20 -25 ml of mixture, place on cookie sheet about 1 ½" apart.

Bake until golden brown. In a convection oven this takes about 10 minutes, in the oven in the hall, it took 15 minutes.....just keep an eye on them.

Store in an airtight container for up to 3 days. But they usually don't last that long!

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COMMUNITY QUILTS: PLACEMATS FOR MEALS ON WHEELS

It's that time of year again...almost the end of the meeting season. So it is time to get your placemats done for Meals on Wheels. Bring your placemats to the **June Business Meeting/Party** and your name will be entered into the **draw for a prize**. We will give the placemats to the Meals on Wheels coordinator in the fall...probably the October meeting.

For those new to the guild, we have been supplying placemats for the "Meals on Wheels" program for many years & they have been received with great anticipation by that program. 


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June James
