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Whipping Cream Substitute

Summer is coming, along with the fresh berries that taste so good with the addition of fresh cream (as do many desserts). Perhaps you have a spouse who is either Lactose intolerant, or allergic to cow's milk, or both. Or you may be that way yourself. Finding decent substitutes for cream is difficult: many substitutes contain whey, others ingredient lists I can't pronounce, never mind know what they are, while others are "edible plastic".

Invariably, once you find one that both tastes good and is available, then not enough people buy it, so the stores no longer stock it.

The following is a substitute I have used for many years. It combines unsalted butter - yes, from cow's milk, but the whey has all been washed out leaving behind pure fat.

Even if you are not lactose intolerant or have milk allergies, this is a cheap substitute for fresh cream.

You will need either a stick blender, food processor or regular blender.

Ingredients

5 fluid ounces milk or milk substitute (almond, soy, rice, cashew)

4 ounces unsalted butter (1/2) cup

1/2 teaspoon powdered gelatin

Put the milk/substitute in a pan along with the butter cut in small pieces, and heat gently until the butter has melted.

Remove from heat, stir well and sprinkle the gelatin over the top, and stir well to mix.

Leave to cool for 1 or 2 minutes, then blend very well using whichever blender you have.

This takes about 2 minutes, or until it is creamy.

Chill in refrigerator, then whip as required.

that Lilli House is very busy now – over 300 women and children stay at Lilli House each year, and approximately 100 women access services at Amethyst House. Sadly, the number of women and children experiencing violence is increasing.

Nerissa Thomas presented a Quilt of Valour on March 31st to Philip Gray in Comox. His wife (standing beside him) nominated him. The lovely quilt was made by "Community Quilter" Peggy Hawkins.

The Baby Group continues to work away at their projects. Teddies and Toddlers have a supply of quilts and fabrics on hand for when the schools and day care are back operating normally.

We continue to receive thank you notes from women who have received breast cancer kits (bags and pillows) after surgery. Another supply will be delivered in the coming weeks.

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Community Quilts Continued

If anyone is looking for small projects to do over the next few months, we could use some placemats. The Soroptomists use the placemats when making up SoroptiPaks, which are given out to women who are leaving the Transition Society centres and setting up their own homes.

We could use sets of 2, for single women, and sets of 4 or more for those with children.



My daughter asked for a quilt with Bees on so made this one with the Yellow Brick Road pattern.



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What I learned from my first quilt project

Years ago now it was my sister who was the quilter, not me. She had already made me a nice wall hanging – and so one year I asked her to make me a table topper for my coffee table – for Christmas. Most Christmas commercial products are red or green – but my couch has a rosy tone that turned pink if I decorated with red, and wanted something that would better suit my odd colour requirement.



I thought I was asking for a simple thing – and was

rather insulted when she responded – " make it yourself ". Little did I realize or appreciate what I was asking – giving no consideration at all to the amount of time it takes to create – nor how difficult it can be to make something for someone else – outside of your normal colour range & the responsibility of choosing fabrics / designs and hoping that you met the vision in someone else's mind. I have since learned how difficult it can be to match someone else's vision.

Determined, I drew out this star I wanted ... and showed her what I wanted to make – to which she said "You can't do that "And being the little sister; that just woke up every stubborn bone in my body – who did she think she was, telling me I could not do that. So I went on down to the Red Barn for assistance with my idea – only to be told "you can't do that "... you see, I had never heard of bias edges – let alone try to figure out the angle of what I wanted to cut. Now I was really determined that this was possible – how dare they !

I then went down to a quilting shop downtown – trying hard to remember the name – Bird's Nest? or something like that? And the lady there took me under her wing and walked me through each and every step – choosing colours that would go with this odd rose couch – and talking about the movement in the fabrics (never did figure out what the movement part was about). Anyhow – she chose the colours and had me cut out my star and add that quarter inch – and sew very carefully – press very carefully – and I carted this project back and forth to the store on a regular basis.

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She had me put extra fabric on the edge pieces – didn't realize until much later this was so the points floated and avoided that risk of cutting one's points off. Eventually came the batting / sandwiching ... and she suggested some simple straight line quilting that would be very effective and even in metallic thread. She was an 'angel'.

Binding – she told me to go buy the current month's issue of Fons & Porter magazine and it had step by step instructions for how to do the binding ... WOW – I was so impressed that she would know what issue the instructions were in – little did I realize those instructions are in EVERY issue.

I was thrilled with the results – (I showed them, didn't I). and I still love this table topper. The only real problem with this topper is the very large lump in the center, with all those seams in one spot. You certainly don't want to sit a candle in the center of this topper – or that glass of wine …I would like to think I could do a better job of that lump now – but have never tried to replace this one – it shares every Christmas with us.

It was years before I did anything else – after all, it was my sister who was the quilter – not me. A few years later, she developed cancer – and died And one of my tasks was to pack up her sewing room – not a small task as you all know. Donate those books – donate that fabric – donate those rulers, notions – the whole swack.

About a year later I was somehow affected by the quilting bug – took a quilting class at Huckleberry's – and had to buy so many of those things I had arranged to be donated She frequently 'sits on my shoulder' when I quilt.



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

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School House Thread Orders

Did you know that the guild has access to a thread supply?

A Canadian company, CanSew, has been supplying us with Cone threads at wholesale prices.

Ardythe Crawford has been providing this service, usually once yearly, for the past 15 years. The guild would like to thank Ardythe for this service as she is retiring. Marlene Hooper has offered to take over for Ardythe.

If you have ordered thread before then you know the process. If not here is some information.

Two types of thread are available – 100% cotton and 100% polyester. The spools hold 6000 yards of thread. The colour choices for the cotton thread are a bit limited



with only 33. The polyester has more of a colour selection with over 100. A colour chart is available for your choices. Arrange with Marlene to view the colour chart.

You can contact Marlene at her e-mail (available from the membership list), to place your order. To best reduce costs – she will wait until there are at least 10 orders before the order is placed. The wholesale cost per spool usually varies between \$30 -\$35 per spool for cotton thread and \$25 - \$30 for polyester thread.

A mandatory deposit of \$30 per spool for cotton thread and \$25 per spool for polyester thread will be required for the order. The final cost may vary – depending on the updated costs during these Covid times and the cost of shipping.

The delivery time is usually a few days – if the thread is in stock in Vancouver. Otherwise, the thread comes from Montreal and takes about a week.

Usually, Ardythe would bring the thread to the guild on Thursdays. Currently the thread pick up will have to be arranged between the purchaser and Marlene who lives in Courtenay, close to the Driftwood Mall.

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Coby's Quilting Adventure

My foray into quilting started in the late 1970's. I worked for Sears in Ottawa and they had a fabric department. One of the girls that worked there had a Mom who was a quilter and from time to time she would come into the store and do a quilting demo. She hand pieced everything and the quilts were all hand quilted.

I loved the look of her work and decided "I can sew so I can do this also". I found a pattern in Family Circle, Feb. 3, 1978 magazine and decided to make it. I used red and blue floral Cranston VIP prints, white poly cotton and royal blue cotton velveteen. All the fabric was cut out with pinking shears. We did not have any fancy rulers, rotary cutters or cutting mats back in the '70's.

I think I unpicked a lot of the blocks 3 times because I didn't like the way it was going together, as a result the blocks ended being smaller than the original pattern directions. Some one told me "You can always throw it out", being frugal I couldn't do that.

The quilt was finished and quilted by a machine quilter in Whitehorse, YT on September 24, 2001. It is still being used but getting thin in places.




Nerissa has been busy

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Block 4 Borrow & Lend

This makes one 12" block



Supply List is for one 12" block


	Colour 1	needs one 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 13" strip And one 2 7/8" x 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ " strip
E.	Colour 2	needs one 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 13" strip And one 2 7/8" x 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ " strip
	Colour 3	needs one 2 ½" 20" strip
	Colour 4	needs one 2 7/8"x 23" strip

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
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Preparing the pieces and sewing the block



First mark and cut the Colour 1 and Colour 2 - 2 $1\!\!/ 2'' \times 13''$ strips into two 2 $1\!\!/ 2'' \times 6$ $1\!\!/ 2''$ rectangles of each



Then mark and cut the Colour 1 and Colour 2 - 27/8" x 11 1/2" strips into four 27/8" squares of each


Mark and cut the Colour 4 -27/8" x 23" strip into eight 27/8" squares. Now cut ALL of these 27/8" squares in half once on the diagonal




Next mark and cut the Colour 3 $- 2 \frac{1}{2} \times 20^{\circ}$ strip into eight 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ squares



Sew half squares, using the Colour 1 & Colour 2 and 4 half square triangles. Make eight of each Colour arrangement shown at left



Now sew side units, by sewing a Colour 3 - 2 1/2" square to the right of a Colour 1 half square, right sides together and using a SCANT 1/4" seam. Press seam allowances towards the center square. Add another Colour 1 half square to the right end, again pressing seam towards center square. Make four units like this, and four more using the Colour 2 half squares...




Next Sew a Colour 1 rectangle between two of the Colour 1 units

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
we just made, pressing seams towards the rectangle. Make one more unit like this. Make two more units in the same manner using the Colour 2 rectangles and side units...

Piece the block by making two rows of alternating units. Press the seam of each row towards the Colour 2 side. Join the rows, and that makes the block!

Have fun with this 4th block.

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Block of the Month continued...

Jean's Block 4 comments


I tried really hard this time to actually follow the written instructions – rather than go by the pictures

Making the HST's

- I had a bit of trouble following these directions
- They have you cut squares of 2-7/8 and then cut them all on the diagonal to triangles --- and then have you sew all the triangles together. With this cutting there is NO wiggle room at all and then direction is to use colour 1, 2 and 4 to make HST's and make 8 of each colour arrangement this had me trying to match up 1 & 2 --- 1 & 4 and 2 & 4 which is not right 1 think you should change the wording to take 4 squares of colour 1 and 4 squares of colour 4 --- draw diagonal line and sew on each side to make 8 HST's that should finish at 2-1/2" square
- take 4 squares of colour 2 and 4 squares of colour 4 draw diagonal line and sew on each side to make 8 HST's – that should finish at 2-1/2" square

Pressing

- I followed the pressing instructions which does have you able to nest the seams of the HST's in the corner --- but has all 4 seams on the same side at all other join points which creates a fair bit of bulk.
- Does not say what to do with final seam so I spun the center to cut down on bulk right at the center point.
- If you look at the diagram below I have drawn RED & YELLOW arrows as to which way they have you press seams so you can see all the spots where all 4 seams are on the same side.



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Clare's comments on Block 4





The instructions were good, as before. However I did make some modifications to avoid cutting all the 2 7/8" squares into triangles and re-sewing into squares, if you're interested. (Text and method taken from previous block instructions.)

For Colours 1 and 2: cut one $3'' \times 12$ strip, subcut into four 3'' squares. For Colour 4, cut one $3'' \times 24''$ strip, subcut into eight 3'' squares.

On the back of the Colour 4 squares lightly mark the diagonal line. Stack these with four Colour 1 and four Colour 2 squares. Sew a scant 1/4" above and below the marked diagonals. Cut these apart on the diagonals between the rows of stitching, giving you 8 of each colour arrangement shown on the diagram. Press the seam allowances to the dark side. Trim these to 2 1/2". Continue with the side units to complete the block.

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
Sheila's eight at a time HST method

4. Cut along marked cutting lines

to make eight triangle-squares.

The trick to this method to work for any size triangle is to cut squares twice the finished size of HST plus 1 3/4 inches.





5. Press seam allowances toward

darker fabric.
