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# Quilting with one arm

At the end of February, I fell on ice and fractured my right shoulder in 2 places and my right tibia in four places. I am right hand dominant. I was told no walking, no weight on right foot – just wheelchair. My first thought was --- oooo – maybe I can get some quilting done. Nope – one handed quilting was not an option for me. So, as I sat here for seven weeks so far, I made a list of tools/tricks I could try as I get mobility back. I have not tried any, so **do research before you purchase any!** 

The obvious one is to move my sewing machines to the dining room table on the ground floor, but since I need two hands to sew quilt seams accurately and then iron – that was a no for my current limitations, but maybe soon.

Electric Scissors or Electric Rotary cutter – handily there is a youtuber who compares the two – my take away is that the electric scissors may work for me, but the electric rotary cutter would just wreck fabric (operator error most likely LOL)

Ergonomic cutter Fiskars – I have this one and you can find it at local stores (google Fiskars rotary cutter ergonomic)

Martelli Rotary Cutter – they are available for right and left hand dominant sewers. This looks promising and I may do some more research on it. What intrigues me about it is that you would hold your hand/arm entirely different, and I may be able to cut sitting down. <a href="https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=golYkAKWjbq">https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=golYkAKWjbq</a>

Fabric Cutting devices – I am not at the point of wanting to purchase one, but if my surgeon doesn't give me the go ahead to start moving or I need shoulder surgery for the fractures, I may revisit that. I have only looked at two so far.

Accuquilt – the electric one would certainly be easy to use with my mobility issues, however, it is quite pricey. Another draw back would be that I would continue to need to buy the diecuts. A selling point is that I can cut backing, batting as well for quilt as you go.

Brother scan and cut – It has a learning curve with the technology, but I am going to do more research on this as it will certainly cut all sorts of shapes and sizes. A drawback is that I can't see how it would be able to do WOF. Coby and Lois took 18 baby quilts to the Public Health Unit on April 2.

Sandy has been getting quilts ready to be delivered to The Transition Society. For the past few months we have been putting labels on the quilts that we donate to various community groups. To make it easier for members to attach labels to quilts before they donate them to us, we are going to be leaving some labels in a baggie that will be attached to the Community Quilts basket in the storage room at the hall. Or please contact Sandy Schille for some. **We would REALLY appreciate it if the quilts are labelled before they are given to us.** 

Are there any guild members who would like to do some quilting for us? Quite often we are given flimsies and we could use some help in getting these quilted. The backing and batting would be supplied and we would do the binding. The machine quilting would not need to be fancy or perfect – this might be a good way to practice a new technique! Please contact Myra or Nerissa if you can help us out.

We ordered batting in January and it was supposed to be delivered sometime in March. I contacted the supplier when it didn't arrive and found out it is a victim of worldwide shipping problems - they had problems getting a truck to get it from the Hobb's factory in Texas. The last update was that a truck had been found and it was now in transit to Canada. So hopefully we will get it in a few weeks. As soon as it arrives it will go to the hall.

I am sure it will be informative and useful for all of us.



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# Foolproof Art Quilting

Katie Fowler
C + T Publishing 2022
Not in the guild library

I've been a little sidetracked by a different kind of book this month. When I purchased 'Foolproof Art Quilting' for myself, I hoped for insight in how to get out of my 'quilters block' which has plagued me for some time. Well, not only did the book help a lot, but even set me to thinking of trying things I never would have thought of doing with fabric, paint and thread.



Have you run across the name Katie Fowler? I find her name popping up a lot these days. Katie is a creativity coach who revels in the 'creativity process for the sake of the process'. "Perfection vs excellence" - well, when you see he work, perfection is not at the top of her list, however, she had a solo show in Houston in 2022.

Her book, 'Foolproof Art Quilting', recently published, is brim full of useful information presented in an easily understood way. By using the analogy of Alice and her adventures after going down the rabbit hole, we are given the option of becoming an art quilter, or not. How do you handle creative crushers (fear, doubt etc)? Perfectionism and comparison are also powerful blocks to becoming creative.

Like all artists, the quilter does need to understand guidelines in order to be successful. Color theory is of utmost importance but is a 'tool, not a rule', and as perhaps with shape or form, a way to engage the viewer and draw them into your quilt. Again, principals of design (balance, emphasis etc.) help produce a cohesive work, pleasing to the eye.

Materials Katie uses are likely not in everyone's tool kit. Fabric paints and fabric markers, Shiva oil sticks and Derwent Intense pencils all have a use. Plain white cotton is the canvas on which you draw and paint.

The process of producing art is shown in steps as Katie draws and paints, explaining why she is doing things as she goes along. And a surprise at the end...... don't be

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afraid to cut up your quilt and reassemble it - you will likely like it much better! Preferable to having it sit in the back of the closet for years.

I looked up 'Katie Fowler quilter' on the internet, and found a short video "Inside Foolproof Art Quilting by Katie Fowler" in which she shows you the complete contents of the book. She is also featured on m.youtube.com with Alex Anderson if you want to find out more about her work.

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# **CAMP HOMEWOOD RETREAT**

# Our next retreat is scheduled for October 18<sup>th</sup> – 22nd, 2023.

#### Sign-up will start at the June business meeting.

The cost per individual for the **four** days will range from \$340. to \$432., depending on the room you choose. These rates are currently an approximation as there is generally a rate increase each year starting with the October retreat.

The starting range includes the three non-updated private rooms in the guesthouse, as well as bunk style dorm rooms in the main lodge which sleep up to 7. However on average there are usually anywhere from 2 to 5 in these rooms. Individuals in these rooms have shared bathroom/shower facilities.

There is a separate handicapped washroom available to any that may require ease of access to toilet or shower.

There are also newer rooms available which sleep up to 3 and have their own washroom, including shower/tub. The cost of these rooms per person will depend on how many are sharing.

All prices include 3 meals a day, along with snacks in the evening consisting of cookies/squares, fruit, coffee, tea, and hot chocolate. The meals at Camp Homewood are plentiful, with lots of selections at each meal . . . you will never walk away hungry!

If you have never been to a retreat at Camp Homewood we urge you to give it a try. It is a lot of fun and a great way to get to

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know your fellow quilters. In the past we have seen a number of quilters who have attended retreat for the first time, and we continue to see more of them becoming regulars.

\*\*A \$50 deposit is required upon registration with the balance due the beginning of October.

We look forward to seeing all of our regulars as well as some first timers for the upcoming retreats. For those of you that plan ahead the spring retreat is booked for February 21<sup>st</sup> – 25th, 2024.

To review, On May 13 my <u>Sew Together Bag</u>, which only has two open spots, is a go. I have made this bag at least 7 times, and while making my Bonza bag, I learned a few tips for this class. I just completed another bag to refresh my memory on the directions. I did make a few errors, which I had to rip out or correct, which was awesome because then I can warn you of what NOT TO DO.

I frequently say, you learn more from your mistakes than if you did it correctly the first time.

This class not only produces the bag, but teaches several techniques, which I suspect is why our industrious president signs up for so many classes. I truly admire her for that. One technique is how to sew in the 4 zippers which is, in my humble opinion, very easy with my tips. Machine binding is also a technique that I use, to a fault, and will coach each participant.

I guess the point of this rant is to encourage all of you to sign up when you can for a workshop, if only to learn a technique that you can use in the future.

Joan Johnson's Roll Top Bag is scheduled for June.

We are thinking about trying mini workshops that involve learning a technique. These would be free and held on a Thursday. More info to follow on that as we firm up details of this concept.
