
BOOK REVIEW by Lois Warner

Machine Quilting in Sections Marti Michell Published by From Marti Michell (2004) Quilt Guild library #406

Have you ever been frustrated by the thought of machine quilting your queen sized project, and consequently taken the easier method of paying to have it quilted? Read on - here you may find the solution to your dilemma.

Marti Michell has embraced the concept of machine quilting in sections since the mid 1970's. In this selfpublished book, she shares her favourite techniques. Remember, a big project is always easier to complete when broken down into smaller portions!

Marti begins by demonstrating three methods of



adding borders after the centre of the quilt has been quilted. 'Flip and stitch' does two jobs at once with the border added and quilted at the same time. Chapter 2 deals with reducing a third of the bulk of the batting as you quilt the centre of the quilt. She removes 1/3 of the batting from each side of the centre and reattaches it with strips of light weight fusible interfacing or hand stitching, then quilts that side before doing the same with the other 1/3 of the quilt. This eliminates much of the bulk when machine quilting and because it is the batting which has been cut and then restitched together, nothing shows on the outside. This book was published in 2004 before the advent of rolls of lightweight fusible interfacing used to join sections of batting. Now it is so easy to rejoin the sections before carrying on with the quilting process.

Quilting big quilts in small sections is the topic of Chapter 3. How do you join those sections together so the quilt does not appear to have been quilted in sections? Six solutions are shown. One or two are likely familiar if you have made one of Sharon Pederson's reversible quilts. Marti presents twelve 'case studies' to demonstrate how each quilt was divided into sections, quilted, then assembled and finished. Surprisingly, the last quilt, "Rose Wreath Appliqué", was assembled in this manner around 1865 - 1870!

Next you'll find four quilt patterns, complete with templates and clear instructions for assembly of the sections, after quilting. Marti leaves no stone unturned as she follows up with her 'Rules for Machine Quilting'. Not surprisingly, she focuses on ergonomics. Her book is devoted to making the quilting of large quilts easier, so it is fitting that she ends the book with suggestions to make your body more comfortable when working.

This book is well worth looking through. The directions are clear, as are all the photographs. Perhaps it will save you money and hard labour at the same time!



Feather Play: Fun with Feathers with Vicki Dods

News Flash!!!

You know, she told me not to bother with her email address because she likes doing things the old fashioned way.

And it seems all of you do too! There has not been one question sent to Miss Fussy Cut's email address, so she's told me to 'shut 'er down!"

Of course, you can still write out your question and place it in the jar on the library shelves.

Dear Miss Fussycut,

Gwen and I have been friends since we were kids, even though we're as different as we can be. Truth to tell, she can sometimes be a bit pretentious. For example, I once introduced her to a neighbour we ran into while strolling through the Filberg. "Fran," I said, "this is my good friend Gwen."

"Actually, Fran," said Gwen, "it's Gwendolen, *d-o-l-en*, the traditional Welsh spelling of the name."

"How nice to meet you," replied Fran, "Sorry, I gotta run!"

But Gwen has a good heart, so when she asked me to accompany her to her granddaughter's ballet recital, I remembered how Gwen had slapped a smile on her face and sat through the entire monster truck competition my oldest son was in. I agreed to go.

Don't get me wrong, I love dancing. A few beers and slapping leather to a sad country song is a fun evening. I love a good Macarena, and the chicken dance gets my heart racing! But ballet? Not so much! I had a double shot of espresso and dropped an extra Red Bull in my purse before she picked me up.

Gwen didn't disappoint. Halfway through, she nudged me (I don't think I was snoring, but can't be sure) and said, "Aubrey is soloing in this next one. She's developed such control *en pointe*."

"What's on pwant?" I asked.

"En pointe? It's French. You know — on point — when the ballerina dances on the tips of her toes."

"Oh yes," I said, suppressing a substantial gas attack from the emergency Coca Cola I'd inhaled

And that's when I thought of my question for you Miss Fussycut.

When I put my blocks "on point" in a quilt, how do I figure out what size to cut the triangles for the ends of the rows and in the corners?

Worrying about this kept me,

Wide-eyed until the end of the performance.

Dear Wide Eyes,

Well, if you thought that ballet was confusing, let's skip French and get right to the point....you will need to do a little math.

We will need triangles! Then, we will need to calculate the square size and cut HST and QST.

But no worries - there are formulas.

Corner triangles will require 4 HST (half square triangles) which are 2 squares cut diagonally.

Divide the finished block size by 1.414 and add .875 (7/8") for seam allowance. Then you can round up to the nearest 1/8". Then give it a diagonal cut and you have two corners already done. Luckily, there are only four corners per quilt so you will only require 2 squares!

Side triangles...no worries, just twice the cutting and calculating!

Take the finished size of the block and multiply by 1.414 and add 1.25 (1 1/4") for seam allowances, rounding up to the nearest 1/8". Now cut your square diagonally twice and the long sides of the set-in triangles will be on the outside edge and you will not have any growing bias edges.

And remember to be gentle with your angles and triangles due to the bias edges which will stretch when you're not looking.

Staying on Point, Miss Fussy Cut

Dear Miss Fussycut,

We have new neighbours beside us. They just moved in last month and we couldn't be happier! We've hit it off right from the start. Great friends!

Anyway, the weather last week was absolutely perfect. Not too hot. I decided to haul my stuff outside to the covered patio and do some quilting. As I was setting up, Claudia called over asking what I was up to. "I think I'll piece some quilt blocks outside today, there's no breeze." (I'd learned that one the hard way. NEVER try to piece 4 1/2 inch sawtooth stars in the wind! I'm just sayin'!")

"You know, I've always been kind of interested in quilting," she said.

"Well, come on over," I said, "I'll make some iced coffee and I'll show you what I'm doing ."

So, twenty minutes later we were sitting on the patio having a good time and Claudia asked me what I was working on. I showed her the pattern, a pretty intricate combination of star blocks that wound up making sort of abstract blocks of colour. "Oh my,"she said, "I didn't realize it was so hard."

"Well you don't start with this kind of thing," I assured her, and told her how I got started with a rail fence and I ran in and got it to show her my first quilt.

"Wow," she said, "and you quilted it by hand I bet!"

That led to a discussion about framing squares with strips, adding stars in the lattice, star quilts, appliqué and drunkard's paths. Each time she'd ask a question I'd say, "I'll show you!" and I'd run in to the house and bring out another pile of quilt tops.

Well, 3 hours later, Claudia freaked out because her sister-in-law and husband were coming over for dinner and she wasn't ready. We said a hasty

goodbye, and when she'd gone I went back out to the patio, looked at the piles of unfinished quilts lying around and thought, "Holy..."

Well, never mind what I thought! It's not really suitable for polite company! But, I realized I was in trouble! The thing is, I've just never really gotten started on machine quilting. I just don't know if I can do it. I've been to shows where they demo those long arms and mid arms, and I just can't afford them. I also watched a lady demo those fancy rulers on one of those new regular machines that are about the size of a Smart Car, but I'm just not into it.

I can't afford that stuff anyway, I have to save up to buy batting!

So Miss Fussy Cut, what advice do you have that will help my faithful Kenmore and I get on with machine quilting? Any way to make it easier?

Waiting hopefully for your answer, I remain,

Knee deep in flimsies!

Dearest Knee deep in Flimsies,

I have to say I am just flabbergasted every time I hear from a quilter so excited to share how easy it was to get started quilting, and now having to tell them not to be intimated by the work of someone who is an advanced quilter. There are very few who start off with totally successful skills.

I say listen to your own words that you just gave Claudia! Get that Kenmore fired up, add on a walking foot and start by quilting one of your simpler flimsies! You know full well that you will not get any better just by looking at more quilts. You've got to practice! And, trying to compare your early success with a quilt done by professional long armer could be a bit discouraging as well.

Start off slowly and keep your pattern simple the same way you did when your first started hand quilting. Or, you may want to start by dropping those feed dogs and give free motion quilting a whirl! Once again, the key is to stay relaxed and take it easy.

Remember your first 1/4 " seam allowances? I bet the ones you do now are all perfect and straight. The same will happen with practice on your flimsies; they will become beautiful and treasured "QUILTS".

Remember, we all know there is a lot more love and warmth from a finished quilt than a dozen flimsies. I once saw a quilting pattern book called, "It's Not A Quilt Until It's Quilted." I've never forgotten that.

You know, another upside to machine quilting is that you can do it outside, even in a little breeze!

You may be knee deep in flimsies now, but before you know it, you will be waist deep in quilts!!!

CAMP HOMEWOOD RETREAT

<u>Sign up now</u> for our next retreat scheduled for February 12th – 16th, 2020.

This will be a *four* day retreat which provides us with lots of valued time for sewing and socializing. It **will run from 11 am Wednesday to 11 am Sunday.** Sign up will start at the December business meeting. If you do not feel you can attend for a full four days, please do not let that deter you from registering as it is a possibility for some of you to attend for three days only.

The cost per person for the *four* days will range from \$278 to \$362, depending on the room you choose. The starting price of \$278 includes the three non-updated private rooms in the guesthouse, as well as bunk style dorm rooms in the main lodge which sleep up to seven people. However, on average there are usually anywhere from 2 to 5 in these rooms. Individuals in these rooms have shared bathroom/shower facilities. There is a separate handicapped washroom available to anyone who may require ease of access to the toilet or shower. There are also newer rooms available which sleep up to 3 and have their own washroom, including shower and tub. These rooms are either \$306 with 3 sharing the room, or \$320 with only 2 sharing.

All prices include 3 meals a day along with snacks consisting of cookies or squares, fruit, coffee, tea, and hot

chocolate in the evening. The meals at Camp Homewood are excellent so you will never walk away hungry!

If you have never been to a retreat at Camp Homewood, we urge you to give it a try. It is a lot of fun and a great way to get to know your fellow quilters. Over the past couple of years we have seen a number of quilters who have attended retreat for the first time, and we continue to see more of them becoming regulars.

If you wish to sign-up or need further information please contact one of the retreat coordinators listed below. Our contact details can be located on the guild website under "retreats" or by viewing the membership list.

For those of you who plan ahead, the 2020 fall retreat is scheduled for October 14th – 18th, 2020.

We look forward to seeing some new members as well as all of our regulars at one of the upcoming retreats.




