President's Message

November

Not only is this a time to remember our Veterans but also past Quilters. You may have a family member who was important to you, a friend, or teacher that perked your interest in Quilting. We go back to the pioneer women who made quilts out of necessity for warmth and then as an expression of their artistry. Women who looked for new and exciting projects, as we still do.

After the first N American cotton textile plant opened in 1790 at Pawtucket Rhode Island, Quilters began the use of small individual blocks. Block patterns travelled from area to area and often acquired a new name each time. Nine-Patch, Irish Chain, Flying Geese, Sawtooth Star to name a few.

The Underground Railway used a secret code with Quilt Blocks. Nine-Patch, Pinwheel and Broken Dishes were secondary blocks. Main blocks could be, Monkey Wrench – that signaled people to gather tools, Bears' Paw – to follow animal trails to food and water and Log Cabin with a yellow centre instead of red indicated a light in the window, and many more.

Some quilts are made using one Quilt block, large pieces, easy sewing and are a great way of showing off fabric and quilting designs. Joining two blocks together you get a secondary pattern that can be amazing. There a few tips and tricks to this but it is easy and fun. Most common is a Nine-Patch and a Snowball, maybe try an Ohio Star and a Shoo Fly, amazing!

Patterns and designs have changed so much since the early 1800s, some of the old patterns are good foundations to build your skills, while some of the newer methods can challenge your creativity. One thing that is true still, the enjoyment of getting together with other Quilters and working on a project. We can thank many women and men who have worked to make Quilting what have today.

<u>CAMP HOMEWOOD RETREAT</u> The time is soon approaching to sign up for our next retreat which is scheduled for February 14th – 18th, 2018.

This will be a *four* day retreat which provides us with lots of valued time for sewing and socializing. **Please note this retreat will run from 11am Wednesday to 11am Sunday.** Sign up will start at the **December** business meeting. If you do not feel you can attend for a full four days please do not let that deter you from registering as it is a possibility for some of you to attend for three days only.

Depending on sign-up numbers we will also have the option of opening up the guesthouse for more private rooms. For further details concerning the guesthouse please speak to one of the retreat coordinators listed below. The cost per individual for the *four* days will range from \$252. to \$305 ... depending on the room you choose. The starting range of \$252. is a bunk style dorm room which sleeps up to 7, however on average there are usually anywhere from 2 to 5 in these rooms. Individuals in these rooms have shared bathroom/shower facilities. There is a separate handicapped washroom available to any that may require ease of access to toilet or shower. There are also newer rooms available which sleep up to 3 and have their own washroom, including shower/tub. These rooms are either \$287. with 3 sharing the room or \$305. with only 2 sharing.

All prices include 3 meals a day along with snacks in the evening consisting of cookies/squares, fruit, coffee, tea, and hot chocolate. The meals at Camp Home-wood are excellent . . . and you will never walk away hungry!

If you have never been to a retreat at Camp Homewood we urge you to give it a

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try. It is a lot of fun and a great way to get to know your fellow quilters. Over the past couple of years we have seen a number of quilters who have attended retreat for the first time, and we continue to see more of them becoming regulars. NOVEMBER 2017 WORKSHOP NEWS

Thank you to Debbie Flannigan who presented 2 great workshops on how to make a 'Sew Together' bag. Both classes were well attended and many beautiful bags were finished before the end of each day. We look forward to seeing all of them at show and tell. We have four patterns for this bag left which members are welcome to purchase from us at the reduced price we obtained from the quilt shop - \$12 including tax.

You can register for classes on most Thursdays, usually between 1 and 2 pm and also on meeting nights for approximately 1 hour before the meeting starts. We will not be registering for classes during breaks at meetings because this is the only time we have to total the deposit and have it ready to submit to the treasurer before the end of the night. You can also mail your cheque and the information on the class you would like to take.

The following classes are coming up:

Saturday, NOVEMBER 18 – JANIS DAVIS – CHRISTMAS DELIGHT \$32

This festive quilt is easily made and can add a warm welcoming touch to your front door or entrance. Or, a set of placemats would make any table sparkle.

Paper piecing allows the quilter to make perfect points every time and is a technique well worth knowing. This paper piecing project is great for beginners. And, if you have some experience with paper piecing, you'll find this a fun project that is quick and easy!!!

This project is 10" x 12" finished.

Sat. DEC. 2 – JUDY MORRISON – LEARNING TO PUT TEXT ON QUILTS \$32

This class will be a review of everything you knew in grade school about lettering (printing) and then a few techniques on how to include lettering in your projects. The workshop includes lettering on paper complete with spacing and construction of letters and then various ways to include fonts and lettering techniques on fabric.

Book Review

Stitched Textiles: Birds Rachel Sumner Search Press 2016 Quilt Guild Library # (this is brand new to the library and I am not sure of the number)

I hope I'm not the only guild member who feels this book is a great addition to our library. Through odd circumstances, I ordered this book from England, and received two copies. The distributor asked only that I let the guild know it was a complimentary copy from "The Book Depository".


A number of members have seen my puffin picture, a project in this book. I found it an enjoyable to

make as the instructions and photos were so clear and very easy to follow. However, although there are six projects in the book, the author is really interested in getting you to make your own picture, rather than simply copying hers.

To begin with, sort through your fabric collection, pick up scraps from the "free table" - they may find a home in your picture. A variety of threads is essential for stitching down fabric scraps and adding lots of highlighting. The addition of "found objects" may add a lot to your work, too.

Design is important, and is treated as such. The author uses a sketch book to record ideas, a scrapbook of clippings from magazines and newspapers, reference books and blank paper to sketch out the main ideas. Artwork in museums, churches and art galleries can be inspirational. Color, in both fabric and thread are as important as the design.

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The background, made up of small squares and rectangles, is first assembled on a piece of interfacing. Once the final arrangement is made, the fabric pieces are stitched down using decorative stitching. Next comes the foreground which will likely contrast with the background in order to stand out. Fusible web is used for the birds etc. in this book (with templates in the back of the book if you are making one of the projects). Through the use of stitching and a variety of fabric textures plus, perhaps, dyeing your own fabric, your picture will be exclusively yours. How to display your masterpiece? Directions for mounting on canvas blocks (dollar store?) is effective. Or have it framed!

There are so many "tips" to guide you in creating a project. For example, in Project 2: Chickens, one tip is "Give a lot of care to how the legs, eyes and beaks sit. These features give a lot of the character. Try moving them around a bit and you will see the difference!"

From "Seagulls on a Boat" to "Bird Ark", this book is full of fun ideas. The three galleries of pictures throughout the book are jumping off points for more ideas. Hopefully this book will make you smile and realize you can do something with those little bits and pieces. Note, the pictures are generally about 12" x 12", so this can be a small project which doesn't have to be perfect - no matching corners and 1/4" seams! Have fun!

Who am 1? part 11

We lived in, Alberta when I first began to quilt. The first quilt I worked on was a Raffle Quilt made by the Handicraft Guild. Others did the piecing, (even then I thought the fabric choice ugly) and the quilt was layered on the big wooden quilting frame, and those of us who had never quilted before, were drafted in. We sat round the frame, were given a needle, short thread, and an even shorter lesson in quilting. I don't THINK anyone removed my stitches at night, but I had a "V" notch in my thumb nail from the needle! I didn't do any more for several years, then I appliqued and embroidered several blocks depicting areas of the town's history for the town's 75th anniversary. The only part I played in the assembly of that quilt was the use of my washing machine to dye the linen background fabric.

Fall Fairs played a large part in rural prairie life, and I was fascinated by the quilts being raffled. I never did win

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one, so finally took a lesson and made my first quilt – a three block Christmas table runner. That too sat for a while by itself at my Mom's home. Then one day I just started playing with fabric, and that was that. My initial claim to fame was being locked downstairs in the basement of the Family Fabric store. I was choosing three fabrics for a quilt. Agonizing over choices wasn't in it. I was taking so long that the staff forgot I was downstairs, and began locking up, when the lights went off downstairs I knew that I was in trouble and ran up the stairs and knocked and knocked on the front window, and one of the staff driving by saw me and rescued me.

One summer, several of us met to stitch at one house. We made a quilt for each of us, and had great fun. We wondered if anyone else would like to do the same. We advertised and held an initial meeting to explore the possibilities. Twenty-five women sat there and smiled and asked when the first meeting was going to be – Prairie Patchers was formed.

Since then I have made many a quilt, and they have traveled many a mile, as have my sewing machines. I also take much less time to choose fabrics, and hate making a quilt with only three fabrics. In fact, my claim to fame now could be that I make many scrap quilts. I like oriental fabrics, and batiks, and I have to use up my stash. (I keep saying that, but it never seems to grow any smaller).

Chicken with Pineapple

This is an adaptable recipe, you can substitute, add more of one thing, cut back on another. I give regular version, but to make it gluten free, use gluten free soy sauce.

2 chicken breasts

 $\frac{1}{2}$ C chopped pineapple (fresh or canned)

- ¹/₂ C whole water chestnuts 2 sticks celery
 - 1/2 C frozen peas or corn, or both
- 1 onion½ C frozen¼ C cornstarch1 chicken C
- 1 2 Tbsp. Soy sauce

1 chicken Oxo sachet 2 + Tbsps. sweet Thai Chili sauce

- $\frac{1}{2}$ 1 C water (use some of pineapple juice)
- $/2 1 \cup$ water (use some of 2 Then oil
- 2 Tbsp. oil
- 1. Cut up chicken into 1 inch cubes. (You can use chicken thighs too)
- 2. Cut pineapple into smaller chunks.
- 3. Slice celery into 1/4 1/3 inch slices, on the diagonal (looks better!)
- 4. Slice onion into segments, skinny ones.
- 5. Mix chicken with cornstarch.
- 6. Heat oil in skillet or wok.
- 7. Shaking each piece of chicken to remove excess cornstarch, (do not chuck the remaining cornstarch) put chicken into hot oil and fry till golden brown on all sides. You might have to turn down the heat. Make sure chicken is cooked through.
- 8. Remove from pan.
- 9. Adding a little more oil if necessary, sauté the onion, then add in celery, peas and water chestnuts.
- 10. Cook until tender crisp.
- 11. Return chicken to pan
- 12. Slake (moisten) remaining cornstarch in the bowl with a little water. You might need a little more cornstarch, depends on how well coated the chicken was.
- 13. Add this to the pan, along with the remaining water (Hold some back in case the sauce is thick/thin enough), and add in the chicken oxo sachet and soy sauce.
- 14. Add in the sweet Thai chili sauce to taste..

Trend-Tex Challenge 2018 - Quilt Canada

How many of you have done a quilt challenge? Why not try it this year? You might enjoy it!

This is the 30th year that Trend-Tex Fabrics has been donating the fabrics for the yearly challenge. The challenge quilts are raffled off by silent auction at Quilt Canada. This is the Canadian Quilters' Association only fund raising activity.

- Theme: The theme for this year's challenge is "Celebrate""
- Five fat quarter fabrics are supplied for the challenge quilt and 3 additional fabrics of your own choosing may be added.
- The design may be original or traditional and any combination of machine and/or hand piecing, appliqué or quilting is acceptable.
- Perimeter must not be larger than 120 inches

This is a wonderful opportunity to be creative and to step out of "the box".

I have made about 10 different challenges for Quilt Canada. I originally made one to support our Canadian Quilting organization but have come to enjoy the creativity that it encourages. I try to make a challenge whenever I am able to travel to Quilt Canada to see what others have done with the theme and the fabrics. I have also purchased several challenges at the silent auction. With Quilt Canada in Vancouver this spring, it is a perfect time to make a challenge or to at least visit and see all the challenges that have been made.

It is not necessary to be a member of CQA in order to purchase a fabric kit but only members are eligible for prizes. Most quilts are entered into the silent auction. I have never expected to win a prize but I try to make a quilt that someone would like to buy. So far my quilts have always received a respectable price. I did once receive a Judge's Choice Ribbon. That was a nice surprise!

For more information about the Challenge, go to the Canadian Quilters' Association web site and click on Trend-Tex Challenge 2018. The challenge fabric kits are available to members October 1st for \$23 and to non-members on November 1st for \$28. They can be ordered through the web site or by regular mail.


