Hello from afar. As much fun as I am having visiting never before seen places, I readily admit that I miss my regular sewing day at the OAP Hall. The comradery I get there, and other venues, is second to none.

Several people asked me if I was bringing a sewing machine along on the trip. No - for two reasons. Firstly, I do not have the space required and secondly, you need power which I only have when plugged into utilities at an rv campground. I am used to roughing it or dry camping.

Therefore, I brought hand work. I know for a few, that is a dirty word while others revere it. Pictured below, are two "collapsible" thread catchers. I saw a you tube video on how to do it and voila! - with minimal preparation it became an ideal project for this trip. They do not take long. I wish now that I had prepared more than 3.



I have visited a few quilt shops en route. I seek out locally represented fabric or fabric that is on sale that I cannot pass up. I have learned that the row by row patterns are no longer available in all participating stores (a move designed to spur rapid involvement with a time-limited incentive to get involved (June to Sept.) deal).

I also have brought a panel which I am hand quilting. It has yet to see the light of day.

While at Gettysburg, I decided to visit a shop called The Thread and Needle. It specializes in materials for reproducing authentic civil war uniforms and the website shows many unique (to me) notions. I was nearby and decided, why not drive the 5 km out of town just to see this unique shop.

OMG! It had soooooo many bolts of quilting fabric, many suspended on custom racks that her son had "MacGyvered". It allows you to swing the bolts aside to see the whole bolt, or the next one. Quite unique! I should have taken a picture.

What also was amazing besides the 4 yards I bought, was the 2 yards of oriental fabric (\$4.50/ yd.- half price) that I bought and loved about 9 years ago. It was in the clearance. I wanted to say "Start the car"!

CAMP HOMEWOOD RETREAT February 15 to 19 2017

So excited to advise all of you that our next Camp Homewood retreat has been scheduled for *four* days, providing us with one additional day of sewing and socializing. It will run from Wednesday through Sunday, February 15th – 19th, 2017. Sign up for the February retreat will be at the November business meeting with a \$50. deposit due upon registration. If you do not feel you can attend for a full four days please do not let that deter you from registering as it may be a possibility for some of you to attend for three days only.

Depending on sign-up numbers we may also have the option of opening up the guesthouse for more private rooms. For further details concerning the guesthouse please speak to one of the retreat coordinators listed below. The cost per individual for the *four* days would range from \$227. to \$267., depending on the room you choose. The starting range of \$227. is a bunk style dorm room which sleeps up to 7, however on average there are usually anywhere from 3 to 5 in these rooms. Individuals in these rooms have shared bathroom/shower facilities. There is a separate handicapped washroom available to any that may require ease of access to toilet or shower. There are also newer rooms available which sleep up to 3 and have their own washroom, including shower/tub. These rooms are either \$254. with 3 sharing the room or \$267. with only 2 sharing. All prices include 3 meals a day along with snacks in the evening consisting of cookies/squares, fruit, coffee, tea, and hot chocolate. The meals at Camp Homewood are excellent . . . and you will never walk away hungry!

If you have never been to a retreat at Camp Homewood we urge you to give it a try. It is a lot of fun and a great way to get to know your fellow quilters. Most quilters who have attended previous retreats become regulars. If you wish to sign-up or for further information please contact one of the retreat coordinators listed below. Book Review

Simple Stained Glass quilts

Daphne Greig & Susan Purney Mark



'Simple Stained Glass quilts' certainly lives up to it's name. Daphne Greig and Susan Purney Mark are Victoria quilters who jointly wrote this book in 2008. Daphne is the owner of 'Patch Works Studio' an online store - and well worth looking up at daphnegreig.com.

This book is written for beginner and experienced quilters alike. The authors refer to their stain glass patterns as 'Too Easy Stain Glass' and as soon as you begin reading their method, it becomes obvious. In six steps, you will have your own unique stain glass quilt. The first thirty pages deal with equipment and supplies. Be cautious about mixing black fabrics (not all blacks are the same!), using 60 wt. cotton thread for the machine stitching gives a fine zigzag line which is almost invisible (and won't show up in certain light as do some nylon invisible threads). Fabric choices are important. Auditioning your focus fabric by placing your stain glass design over sections of the fabric will help you see what you really wish to see 'out the window'.

A simple project, "From my window" is presented, step by step, to guide you through the construction process. First, prepare the leading by tracing the pattern (found at the back of the book) onto fusible web. This is then ironed on to the leading fabric (generally black), and the design is carefully cut out, before the leading is fused to the focus fabric. The borders are added, the quilt is sandwiched with thin



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batting and backing, then quilted. Quilting is done with a fine thread and zigzag stitched around all edges of the leading. More quilting can be done to enhance features of the focus fabric, if desired, then the quilt is bound and a hanging sleeve attached.....Simple!

This book doesn't limit itself to views out a window. There are leaded flowers with floral backgrounds, modern spinning wheel projects and very interesting house projects. This technique is not limited to wall quilts either - try a design on a cushion, tote bag or frame a photo printed on fabric - endless possibilities.

Leading patterns are included in a pouch inside the back cover. Throughout the book, clear directions are shown with explanations for adapting these patterns to the size of your focus fabric. Only one question arises - how do you use up pieces of fusible web backed fabric left over from cutting out the leading? Any suggestions?

Placemats For Christmas Hampers

In case some of the new members do not know, we do placemats for the unsponsored Christmas hampers every year.

Families always get the corporate sponsors & the singles are left out of the sponsorship program and end up with skimpy unappealing hampers. So a few years ago we started giving the Salvation Army placemats to give a little colour to the singles hampers.

There are many wonderful patterns out there for placemats & lots of simple ones as well. One thing I have done this year is to take all the orphan blocks I could find, mine & others, and have put them into packages with backing & batting just waiting for someone to complete. They are located in the hamper in the store room. Orphan blocks of any size can be used for placemats...just add borders to make the placemat approximately 13" x 17" which is the ideal size for placemats.

There is also a pattern on the website to make 4 placemats from 4 fat quarters or you can use scraps to make up a single placemat with instructions on the 4th page of the instructions on the website. There is backing fabric & batting available from any Community Quilts committee members. And if you need any Christmas fabric...just ask...I have lots!!!!

Hope everyone is willing to make a placemat or 2 before the December meeting.

Does it Work?

When it comes to quilting, do not believe everything you hear or read. There are many tips one reads, or hears about, or are spoken of with absolute authority, but do they work? Or do they only work for some?

I've come to the conclusion that there are quilt gremlins who decide whether or not something will work. A bit like my "Red Light Mojo". Most people have a "Green Light Mojo". Not me, I add 15 – 20 minutes to most of my journeys as traffic lights nearly always turn red as I approach, hence the name of my mojo.

#1. If you prick your finger when hand stitching, and bleed onto your fabric, your own saliva will remove the stain.

O.K. Something is wrong with either my blood or my spit, or is it the gremlin laughing?

#2. When it comes to threading a hand sewing needle, and you have problems, hold the thread still and move the eye of the needle onto the thread.

Yup, After many attempts at the above method, I'm the one you see removing her spectacles to peer at both the eye of the needle and the end of the thread (well licked to make it hold together in a nice point – my spit does work for some things), and pushing thread through eye of needle.

Here is where I say a heartfelt "Thank You" to who ever invented the self threaders on sewing machine.

#3. The larger the needle, the larger the stitch. If you have ever tried hand quilting, you will know this to be true. Use the smallest needle you can handle and you will have smaller stitches, whether hand quilting or other hand work.

#4. Use a pencil for marking fabric for (reverse) applique. Yes, you can as they have nice sharp points, and the markings will be covered by stitching or the fold etc. BUT make sure the pencil is an H, HB or even B pencils have softer graphite in them, and smudge when you handle fabric with marks made by those (and it doesn't come off despite all efforts and mixtures of Dawn dish soap, water and rubbing alcohol).

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
#5. Make a trial block when trying out a new pattern. I used to think that silly and a waste of my time. Not any more!

If I had done that prior to cutting out the 1400 patches called for in the pattern, and then making the blocks, I would have found out that the pattern does not give the actual size of the blocks. Not a problem? Oh yes it is! Two smaller blocks are meant to join together to form a sash with which to join the larger blocks, which is a weird size. Getting the two smaller blocks to fit together is definitely taxing my patience, never mind them actually working with the larger blocks! (Just ask anyone sitting near me on a Thursday).

I think my "Red Light Mojo" has joined forces with the quilting Gremlins. No wonder my hair is white!

P.S. I really do like quilting, honest.

Nov 11 to Nov 13 2016




Personal Information Changes
