We see it as an opportunity to show the many aspects of today's quilting – from traditional designs, modern, and fabric art. And not just quilts but all sorts of quilted items.

We would have some of the elements of a traditional quilt show, such as vendors, raffles and a tea room. We might also have demonstrations going on, showing various types of quilting; displays of the different types of sewing machines and quilting tools - how they have changed quilting (and sewing) over 125 years.

### **Quilt a Travel Souvenir**

After 2 1/2 years of 'lock downs', mask wearing and vaccinations, likely most of us are weary of Covid 19. Some of us have suffered, whether through catching Covid, being close to someone with the virus or sheer feelings of desperation/isolation, and now seems to be a time of more freedom and less anxiety. Travel, whether it be local or far afield, seems to be on a lot of people's minds these days.

Can we travelers make our trips more meaningful on our return home? Photos are great - are they accessible? Do you need to always be there to explain them? How about making a souvenir quilt? Think about capturing your memories in fabric and thread to enjoy for a long time. You may have collected special fabrics from places visited, but also novelty prints can be used to symbolize specific places or types of vacations. Of course you can include scanned photos in your quilt, especially effective would be placing them in the 'Attic Window' setting!


Another suggestion is the use of named blocks to represent something you have seen or done. An example could be the 'Tulip' block or 'Windmill' block, after a trip to the Netherlands. What about embroidery - the Eiffel Tower? VanDusen Botanical Gardens in Vancouver?

Color can express so much! Using colors specific to what you have seen is very effective. Aqua, teal and blues could represent a cruise in the Mediterranean. A trip to Ireland would be a wonderful way to use '40 shades of green'!

Embellishments such as buttons and badges purchased on your travels can be incorporated into a quilt design. Do you have a digitizing software program? Try using it to scan simple meaningful images which can be used in your quilt (eg, fruit to remind you

of market days in Germany). And, lastly, don't overlook any built-in embroidery stitches on your sewing machine. A skiing holiday could use 'snowflakes' while a trip to Greece would be an appropriate place for a 'Greek Key' design in a border. Your imagination could be limitless!

I am including a photo of a cover of a book I own, and from which I gleaned many ideas. I am sure there are a lot more books and articles focusing on preserving your travel memories through quilting. Check out the public libraries as well as our guild library. Have fun!

#### **CAMP HOMEWOOD RETREAT**

# There are still spots available for our fall retreat , which runs from October 12th – 16th, 2022.

This retreat runs from 11am Wednesday through to 11am Sunday.

The cost per individual for the **four** days will range from \$320. to \$404., depending on the room you choose. The starting range of \$320. is a bunk style dorm room which sleeps up to 7, however on average there are usually anywhere



from 2 to 5 in these rooms. Individuals in these rooms have shared bathroom/shower facilities.

The shared bathroom facilities have just been re-done, so should be nice. As well there is a separate handicapped washroom available to any that may require ease of access to toilet or shower.

At this point all the newer or private rooms have been booked, however still a couple of double beds available, and bottom bunks.

All prices include 3 meals a day along with snacks in the evening consisting of cookies/squares, fruit, coffee, tea, and hot chocolate. The meals at Camp Homewood are unbelievable . . . and you will never walk away hungry!



## Sustainable Quilting 2022-2023 Quilt Trend

A quilting trend that started in 2022 is sustainable quilting which is also called eco-quilting or ecofriendly quilting, but what, exactly, is it? The idea behind eco-quilting is to reduce the amount of textile waste which can make up almost 10% of solid waste in a year.

There are three components to sustainable quilting.

The first component is quilting/sewing. From QuiltingDaily and Gathered, here are some tips to ecofriendly sewing:

- Save scraps to stuff small projects
- Organize scraps by: colour or size for easy use
- Going digital digital magazines, books, patterns, etc
- Use 'Frankenbatting' batting that is pieced together
- Sew from Stash
- Gift our guild has the free table to put items on for others to use/upcycle.

The second component is purchasing eco-friendly quilt cotton. When buying quilt cotton, you can take into consideration eco-friendly/sustainable products as well. Robert Kaufman has a line called 'greenstyle' with includes organic cotton which has a reduced impact on the environment. It also includes BCI cotton which is produced by using water efficiently.

The third component is considering where the quilt cotton is made and then shipped from. The farther it ships, the more of a carbon footprint is used.

- Moda Korea/Japan
- Kona Korea/Indonesia/Thailand
- Banyan Batiks Indonesia
- If you know of any North American ones, post into the FB group

Sustainable quilting is a personal choice and every little bit helps the planet. I know many of us 'sewed from our stash' during COVID, and I found that I barely made a dent. One of my quilt resolutions for the rest of the year is to try to continue that. If quilt stores had signs indicating eco-friendly cotton, I would try to shop those lines first. Unfortunately, I can not help where the fabrics are sourced, but will look for Canadian Distributors and shop at Local Quilt Shops first.


