President's Message

When we became Quilter's did we see this love of fabric coming? To go into a shop and see all the wonderful colours, the amazing designs and feel the finish of the fabric. Sometimes that is all we need, to look, but more often, some fabric leaves with us.

Seems many quilters are gardeners or appreciate the outdoors. A very simple Alder tree can go from the red of the spring buds, through to beautiful green leaves of summer and onto the browns or gold's of fall. Everywhere you look there are so many colours. Green is a very good example, or maybe blue or red and on it goes. Colour wheels are a big help for those who are not so sure.

The designs attract us as well, from fun and whimsical, nature's flowers and leaves, to the intricate designs of the Japanese prints. Some fabrics are screen printed, some dyed and the batiks, a resist dye process.

Panels have changed a lot over the last twenty years and have now found a new popularity with patterns made just for them. Fabric designers are truly talented.

We touch fabric, is it rough, smooth, satiny, may-

be a little metallic paint to highlight a design. We look at the weave, will the fabric fray, will it stand up to use. We may not consciously go through all these steps, maybe it is love at first sight and we need to buy some. Often these are the fabrics we still have a few years later.

Our Guild has a free table. You have made two quilts already, or you never want to see that colour again, on to the free table.

Some patterns, some books, a few notions and sometimes a really nice piece of fabric makes its way to the free table.

Be kind to the free table, because you know, if no one wants what you put there, you will need to take it home again. Think recycle first, then free table.

Is fabric affordable? We watch for sales, end of bolt specials but when that one piece comes along, we can't live without, that love at first sight piece, we buy it.

CAMP HOMEWOOD RETREAT

Mark the Dates . . . our next Camp Homewood retreat is scheduled for October 17th – 21st, 2018. We have found the *four* day retreat provides us with lots of valued time for sewing and socializing. Please note this retreat will run from 11am Wednesday to 11am Sunday. Sign up will start at the June business meeting. If you do not feel you can attend for a full four days please do not let that deter you from registering as it is a possibility for some of you to attend for three days only.

Depending on sign-up numbers we will also have the option of opening up the guesthouse for more private rooms. For further details concerning the guesthouse please speak to one of the retreat coordinators listed below. The cost per individual for the *four* days will range from \$252. to \$305., depending on the room you choose. The starting range of \$252. is a bunk style dorm room which sleeps up to 7, however on average there are usually anywhere from 2 to 5 in these rooms. Individuals in these rooms have shared bathroom/shower facilities. There is a separate handicapped washroom available to any that may require ease of access to toilet or shower. There are also newer rooms available which sleep up to 3 and have their own washroom, including shower/tub. These rooms are either \$287. with 3 sharing the room or \$305. with only 2 sharing. All prices include 3 meals a day along with snacks in the evening consisting of cookies/squares, fruit, coffee, tea, and hot chocolate. The meals at Camp Homewood are excellent . . . and you will never walk away hungry!

If you have never been to a retreat at Camp Homewood we urge you to give it a try. It is a lot of fun and a great way to get to know your fellow quilters. Over the past couple of years we have seen a number of quilters who have attended retreat for the first time, and we continue to see more of them becoming regulars . If you wish to sign-up or for further information please contact one of the retreat coordinators listed below. Book Review

This month Lois reviewed two books by the author Ellen Anne Eddy.

Thread Magic: The Enchanted World of Ellen Anne Eddy Martingale & Co 2005 Guild Library # 308

Thread Magic Garden Create Enchanted Quilts with Thread Painting & Intuitive Applique Ellen Anne Eddy C & T Publishing 2012 Guild Library # 4

Ellen Anne's first book, "Thread Magic" has become a classic text on free-motion stitching and fibre art. "Thread Magic Garden" follows a theme (gardens) but builds further on free motion stitching with even more wonderful techniques.

Carola Russel, from Carola's Quilt Shop in Gibsons, recently gave a workshop for our guild, "My Little Chickadee". Among a number of interesting techniques taught, was making our own little bird. Carola referred to the method used in "Thread Magic", her preferred way to make heavily stitched appliques on quilts. Curiosity got the better of me and I borrowed both Ellen Anne Eddy's books from our guild library - a bit of an eyeopener. If you wonder about where the author's ideas originate DO NOT miss reading "Finding the Beginning" and "I paint what I see" at the very beginning of "Thread Magic". Her quilts may not be to everyone's taste, but in using the methods presented in both books you can make whatever you wish, in your own vision.

All the quilts in "Thread Magic" are square or rectangular and traditionally

bound. The quilts in the "Garden" spill out in every direction. To do this, the use of crochet cotton held in place by a couple layers of buttonhole stitch around the quilt edge is a perfect way to bind the quilt.

"Thread Magic" wants you to look closely at the quilts shown in the first half of the book - be sure to read the captions. So much can be learned from how the author went about achieving the final result. Take a look at 'Silent Splendor' (pg. 57) - for many of us, the back is likely preferable to the front of the quilt! It is in this book that the author explains how thread painting on fabric distorts the background far too much. It is preferable then, to make the applique as a separate unit, cut it out and attach it to the quilt top with matching thread.

Color theory, design equipment and materials are dealt with in both books. Evidently you can use almost any kind of thread or yarn in your machine, either by sewing thick yarns to the surface (couching), or winding them on the bobbin and sewing from the back of the quilt (bobbin work). Metallic thread wound on the bobbin and stitched from the quilt back is less likely to break since it is so fragile.

After spending time reading both books I have concluded they are well written, well illustrated and excellent teaching material. The author teaches a series of fibre art courses called "Thread Magic" across the U.S. Given that having her personally give us a class would likely be financially out of reach for our guild, our library books are the next best thing.

Getting to Know Our Guild Members

Meet Guild Member – Barbara Messer

I was born in Windsor, Ontario and have two older sisters, Shelia and Linda, who still live in the Windsor area. It was my grandmother who introduced me to the world of sewing. She was an excellent sewer and made new dresses for me to wear to school. A dress made for me by my Nana was my kindergarten show and tell. I was 11 when Nana passed away and I asked to move into her room in hopes of her coming back to visit me – she never did. I was allowed to use her Singer Featherweight and I made stuffed toys and little outfits for my cousins, nephews and niece. I learned a lot more about sewing in Grade 7 Home Ec.



I met my husband, Doug, in 1975, when my sister Sheila thought we would be a good match. Doug and I were engaged when he told me he wanted to join the Canadian Armed Forces. I thought that was terrific. We would get to travel, see the country and possibly the world. I love to travel. My Dad was in the British Merchant Navy and said I got my travelling bug from him, my mother did not like travelling.

As you can imagine, neither a recruit private nor a high school student with a part time job at the library have much money to spend on a wedding dress. My mother-in-law encouraged me to make my own wedding dress. I was a bit apprehensive to say the least. We went to the Bridal Shop and I showed her the dress I wanted, then went to the fabric store and bought a pattern, 7 yards of material, notions and a good pair of Singer scissors. I had problems with the Singer Featherweight, the big one being the fabric kept bunching up. I didn't know what to do. I talked to Doug's Mum and she loaned me her Kenmore machine with the drop in cams. I used her machine to start making my dress in February and in June, Doug's Mum gave me the sewing machine for my birthday. Wow! We were married in August 1977 after I graduated Grade 13. My husband loved the dress.

Our first posting was to the beautiful Comox Valley. I wasn't too sure about moving to Vancouver Island because I didn't know how to swim. Doug assured me it was a very big island and I didn't have to swim. When we first moved here we often took short trips over to Vancouver to be back in a big city and after we were here a little while, we never wanted to leave. We were involved in bowling, darts, we loved camping and 4-wheel drives. I didn't do a lot of sewing for many years.

I worked selling vacuum cleaners, as a waitress in the Pewter Dining Room at the Courtenay Hotel and bookkeeper/clerk at the Central Island Arts Alliance. I decided to join the military. It took me awhile to get in because there was a height restriction. Now, my nickname is "Munchkin" or "Munch" for my great height but, because of my (Continued on page 10)

education and trade selection they waved the restriction and I was able to join. I was heading to Cornwallis, NS for basic training so I had to learn to swim. Before I left Doug taught me to tread water. At the time, it just seemed like he was trying to drown me in the ocean here at Air Force Beach.

I became an Avionics technician working on the radios, radar and instruments in the aircraft. When Hope heard what I did in the military she said to me, "Oh you're smarter than you look!" Thanks, Hope (I think). Doug & I were posted to Cold Lake, AB and spent 6 yrs. there. Next we were posted to Baden Soellingen, Germany for 4 years (not nearly long enough), then back to Cold Lake, AB for 8 more years. After many years of asking, were again posted to Comox. Another posting back to Cold Lake was avoided in 2004 when Doug was offered a civilian job on base here so he retired from the military with 28 years and moved to the next hanger. I continued to work in 407 Sqn. until I retired in 2007 after 25 years in the Air Force. Doug worked 12 years for IMP and retired a second time in October 2016.

I started quilting our second posting to Cold Lake. The first things I made were table runners, quillows, place mats and baby quilts. I then started on bigger quilts; a twin size Lover's Knot for my Mom, a queen size Trip Around the World Colour Splash for Doug's Mum and many other things since then.

When we came back to Comox, I went to the Quilt Show at the Florence Filberg Centre and learned of the Schoolhouse Quilters. I joined the Guild in January 2001.

I love the people, my weekly socializing, getting new ideas and going to the wonderful retreats.

Other activities I am involved in are playing Mahjong on Mondays and going to the gym on Wednesdays.

Lately we have been travelling as much as we can. So far we've been to Hawaii, the Mediterranean, Ontario, Cuba, a motorcycle trip to northern BC and Disney World in Florida. 


